the tilt was clearly in Packard's hands from the outset, though it took the Nittany matman considerable time to secure his winning half-nelson and crotch hold.

Hollobaugh kept time with the undefeated season's record set by himself and Packard, when he maintained a two-minute, twelve seconds time advantage over Meeker, the Blue and Gold light-heavy.

Despite a margin of about twenty pounds in favor of Wilson, Navy's heavyweight, Tiny Cramer exhibited such a degree of skill and speed as to out-time the Nittany wrestler, Wilson, who was not adverse to taking chances which ultimately put him at a disadvantage, found himself defeated in two extra periods by Cramer's one minute, thirty-eight seconds' time advantage.

The first man of Penn State's two losses was accounted for when Captain Ashford quickly despatched the Lion heavyweight, Steele, who was caught underneath while trying for a hold. Chenoweth, the Nittany 135-pounder, lost a close encounter with Weiss, when the Navy matman maintained a time advantage of one minute, twenty-seven seconds.

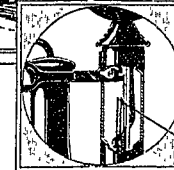
