

BATSMEN ARRANGE TWENTY CONTESTS

Baseball Aspirants Commence Pre-Season Practice in Stock Pavilion

1927 VARSITY RETURNS MINUS TWO VETERANS

With a schedule of twenty games before them, Coach Hugo Bezdek's baseball aspirants have begun pre-season practice in the Stock Judging Pavilion.

At present only the battery men have been called out, but as soon as the weather permits, infielders and outfielders will start without on Holmes field.

Prospects for this year's team are promising since last season's infield and outfield will no doubt remain in tact with the exception of one or two changes. Captain Bus Harrington, who is recovering from an operation for appendicitis and Al Lesko will be the strongest contenders for the catching post.

The other veterans who are back this year are Roepke, Van Atta, and Hannes, pitchers, Cy Lungren, first baseman, Debeant at second base, Kent at short stop, Albe Wolf at third baseman, George Delp, left field and Eugene Singley, center field. Lockard and Fiye, pitchers, and Wolfe, third baseman, of last year's freshman team are promising varsity material.

Good Teams Scheduled

The 1928 schedule as arranged by Manager Frank M. Gager '28, includes nine games at home and eleven away. The annual southern trip includes visits with the University of Virginia, April second, Duke university, April third; Wake Forest college, April fourth; Elon college, North Carolina champions, April fifth; Randolph-Macon college, April sixth; Georgetown university, April seventh. The six contests at home following the southern trip are: sixth, Juniata, April twelfth; Dickinson, April fourteenth; Gettysburg, April twentieth; Ursinus, April twenty-first; Villanova, April twenty-eighth.

On May fourth and fifth the Lion batsmen play a double-header with Syracuse at Syracuse, while on May twelfth they will meet Albright college here. The eastern trip includes games with Pennsylvania, May sixteenth; Princeton, May seventeenth;

vanage. Coach Carlson's dribblers added another five points to their lead before the Blue and White pass-ets could find the basket again. Zeh-fuss responded to Jacobson's shot toss and Reilly's free throw by shoot-ing a foul and a field goal. Hannas and Reilly diminished the Panther lead with a two-pointer apiece and Pittsburg called time out.

After play was resumed, Reilly and Jacobson accounted for one apiece from the penalty line and Coach Carl-son substituted Fisher for Hyatt. At-ter Wunderlich added a free throw to the Panther score, Hannas cut down Pittsburg's lead to three points with a short toss. Long shots by Wun-derlich, Reed and Wroblecki brought the count up to 21 to 15 when the half ended.

Von Nieda Leads Offense

To open the scoring in the second period, Von Nieda sunk a cut shot and the Panthers rang up seven points

before the Lion captain accounted for another tally on a log toss. In the period that followed Von Nieda dropped in four field goals while Reed scored two.

Coach Hermann sent in Baron for Lungren, but the substitute guard sprained his ankle and had to be re-leased. Reilly was returned to the cen-ter post, which had been occupied by Delp, and Jacobson was removed. In a frantic effort to score during the last seven minutes, the Blue and White quarter managed to add but one point while the Panthers tallied ten. The game ended with the count 45 to 28.

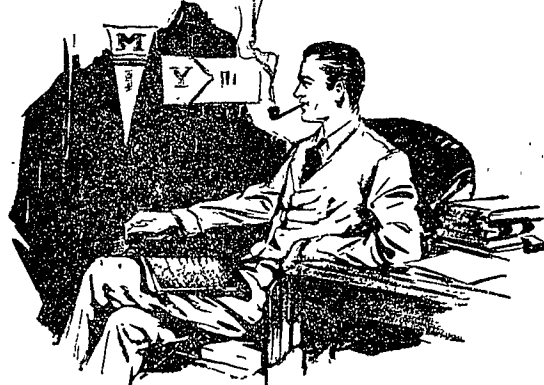
