The measure was first introduced in the General Assembly in 1923 and passed both houses at that time. It was again introduced in 1925 and passed both houses with small opposition, but because of some technicality, it was decided not to submit it to the people until 1928.

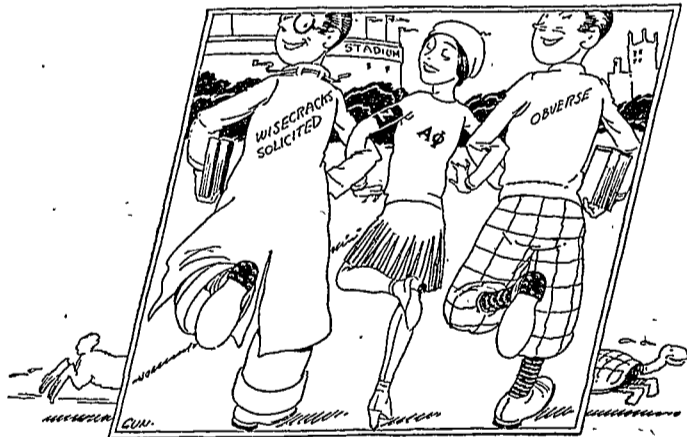
