The Juniata's retaliated with a run in the fifth Miller, first man up, slashed a single to center and scored on a passed ball and a fielder's choice.

The Nittanyites added another marker in the fifth, when Delp and Lesko walked and Wolff scored the former, with a single to center. The final tally of the contest came as a result of Dobbela's pass and Lungen's double to left.

Whitewash Dickinson

The Lion sluggers opened fire on Forman, Dickinson pitcher, in the first inning. Passes to Kent, Dobbela and Delp, Lesko's single, Wolf's out, Single's double and Captain Harrington's triple yielded six runs. The Carlisle representatives were ragged in the field, due partly to the wetness of the diamond. Although annexing eight safe blows, one of which was a double, they never threatened the Lion lead.

Coach Bezelek's proteges bunched their hits to good advantage, scoring

twice in the second, once in the third, fourth and seventh and three times in the eighth. Dobbela opened the second session with a one-base blow to right, Delp advanced him with a single to center, Lesko grounded out but Allie Wolf tallied both mates, with a safe blow to right. A delayed double steal by Harrington and Kent, with the former scoring, featured the Lion activities in the third.

The Blue and White batsmen continued their slugging in the fourth and seventh innings. Delp's single and Al Lesko's triple to deep left were the cause of a run in the former session, and Singley, reaching first on an error, tallied in the seventh when Van Atta singled and Jacobson, pinch-hitting for Kent, doubled to left.

The Nittany diamond men completed their scoring for the day when they bunched three hits and a base on balls in the eighth to tally three runs. Lungen beat out a hit to third and Delp slashed a triple to right. Parana, substituting for Lesko, hit a single over third scoring Cy and George Singley then dove in the final marker with a three-base blow to center.

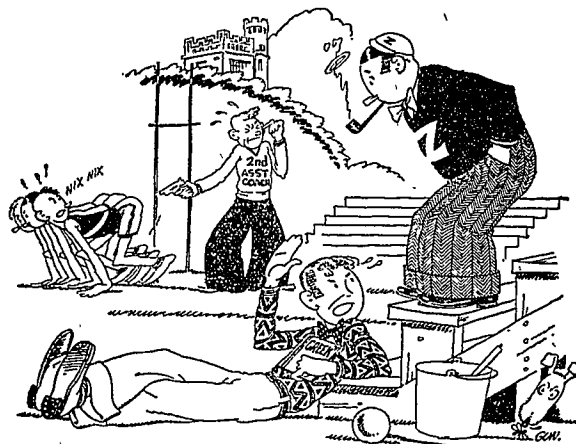
