**W. S. G. A. OFFICIALS WILL MEET AT STATE IN 1930**

Spirit of Self Government Becomes Important Subject for Association Leaders

The Mid-Western sectional conference of the Women's Student Government Associations will be held at Penn State in 1930, according to the report brought back from the Conference held at Carleton college, Northfield, Minnesota. This will be attended by approximately eighty girls, representing thirty-six colleges.

Penn State was represented at last week's conference by Ellen Burkholder '28, president of W. S. G. A. and Helen Boyle '29, president-elect.

One of the big themes which was discussed was the spirit of self government. Dean Georgia L. White of Carleton college emphasized the fact that the right spirit back of the government is as important as the machine that operates it; success does not rest with the officers. The efficiency of the W. S. G. A. organization can be measured by the kind of girl it develops and her attitude toward self government.

None of the colleges represented had a Women's Handbook that could compare with the one published at Penn State. The local delegates received many compliments on the organization of Penn State's Handbook.
