Hard-Hitting Outfield

The former is well remembered by Nittany enthusiasts as the scintillating quartetback on last year's Syracuse grid machine. Sibus is the hardest hitter of the trio maintaining a .400 average for the contests waged thus far.

In the inner garden, the Hillmen will start Benzen at first base and Peck at the keystone bag. Paul Horowitz will scoop up the hot ones at shortstop and Coidisco will protect the third sack. As catcher, Coach Carl is almost certain to start Deming, last year's reserve backstop. Captain Lambert, George Mina and Balslev will display their twirling ability against the Bezedek-coached Lions.

Nittany Line-up Unchanged

The identical line-up that has seen service in the encounters waged so far will oppose the Salt city batsmen. George Dely is slated to start in left field and Gene Singler will cover the pastures in center. Captain Harrington, when not catching, will round out the outfield.

Prof. Cloetingh Revises Script To Make Play Intelligible For Modern Audience

Announcement has been made by the Penn State Players of the selection of the characters for their Commencement Week production, an up-to-date version of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night." The cast is composed of Robert Pritchard '29, Steinhilber '31, Jesse McKnight '31, Anton Haidt '31, Milton Young '30, Miles Suchel '31, Oville McCandless '29, Frank Morris '31, Kenneth Holteim '31, Misses Anne Mellinger '31, Josephine Hanfield '28 and Olive Oesthout '30.

The play will be enacted in present-day style with the introduction in modern dress and speech. Prof. Arthur C. Cloetingh, who is directing this production, has revised and re-written the play in order that it will be intelligible to a modern audience. Contrary to the former custom, the play will be presented on Monday night of Commencement Week instead of Friday evening.
