

## College Sets Record With 719 Degrees During '27-28

Including the Commencements of last August and February, statistics show that Penn State has awarded a grand total of 719 bachelor degrees for the academic year, thereby setting a new record, while the outgoing class at the sixty-eighth annual ceremony, June twelfth, almost equalled the total of all graduates for the first forty-two years of the College history. The class numbered 681 and the advanced degree set a record number of 608.

The School of Engineering led in the number of graduates with 107. The School of Liberal Arts had 144 graduates, School of Education 104, School of Chemistry and Physics 51 and Mines and Metallurgy, eighteen. In the schools of Arts and Education the bachelor of arts degree totalled 211.

In addition to the bachelor diploma, twenty-seven advanced degrees were

awarded, three of them the doctorate degree. Doctor of Philosophy degrees were given for outstanding work in chemistry to Gregg M. Evans, graduate of the College of Emporia, Kenneth H. Goode, a graduate of the University of Chicago; and Frederick A. Steele, graduate of the University of Notre Dame.

Thirty seniors were given commissions as second lieutenants in the United States Army Reserve corps, having qualified through R. O. T. C. training. Four others will receive commissions when they reach the age of twenty-one. This record group received commissions through Col. Clifford McLaughlin, College commandant.

The oldest living alumnus of the College, J. E. Wright, '68, of Beaver, was here for the recent ceremonies. He was paid special tribute at an alumni dinner.

## SUMMER SESSION LISTS ADVANCE NURSE TRAINING

American Red Cross To Present Two Teaching Courses For Graduates

Aiming to prepare graduate nurses to teach home hygiene and the care of the sick the American Red Cross is presenting two courses of study at the nineteenth annual summer session of the College.

Principles of Teaching, the first course, is concerned with laws of learning and general class room procedure. The correlated course, Methods and Presentation of Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick, takes up in detail the study as approved by the American Red Cross for this subject.

These two subjects require both time and energy on the part of the graduate nurse. In addition to attending lectures and classes and her own practice teaching the nurse will find it necessary to spend a certain amount of time each day for reading, study and preparation. The ultimate aim of the course is to train the nurse to become an effective teacher of her subject and at the same time remain at ease before her classes.

## Forestry Department Holds Summer Camp

Eighteen freshman forestry students of the College are attending a six weeks summer camp located in the heart of the Nittany mountains near Lamar in Clinton county. The camp will continue until the latter part of this month under the direction of forestry department officials.

The camping grounds are in the midst of a large tract of timber land owned by the Rochester, Pittsburgh Coal and Iron company and provides opportunity for extensive forestry and timber cruising activities for the young woodsmen.

Eleven advanced forestry students are spending four weeks at the summer camp located at Hodines, twenty miles north of Williamsport. These students will join the freshmen during the last two weeks of the summer camp.

## College Entomologist Studies at Insectary

To investigate the life habits and ways of effectively controlling the corn borer and other insect pests troublesome to Pennsylvania farmers, an insectary has been erected at the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The building will be used this year by Hailan N. Wothley, research entomologist, for experiments on the effectiveness of various insecticides in killing eggs and young larvae of the European corn borer.

State College is two-hundred, and fifty miles south and east of any experimental station where this insect has been studied, under different climatic conditions, and it is believed that important variations may be found to have occurred in the habits of the corn borer as a result of its spread from the shores of Lake Erie to central Pennsylvania.
