effect on your public? On your institution?

Public Institution

"Penn State is a great public institution, and belongs to the people of the State. Our appeal is not an appeal for support of a selfish interest. If Pennsylvania would support her state college as does New Hampshire, we would receive nine and a half million each year, and if this college received in proportion to its wealth and population as does the Oregon State College, we would have twenty-two and a half millions each year! For the present biennium Penn State has received from the State, \$2,000,000 a year, three-fourths of that amount for maintenance of all its activities in instruction, research and extension."

Other comparisons of higher educational appropriations in other states were cited by the President, and he told of the low ranking of this state in provision of educational opportunities for the number of young men and women of college age Penn-

sylvania ranks twenty-second in spite of the fact that there are fifty-three colleges and universities in the state, he said.

Distribute Booklets

As students entered the Auditorium each received a copy of the new illustrated catalogue of the College, which is published to help young people in high schools to determine the selection of their college courses. Enclosed were copies of Bond Issue information in the form of printed leaflets, additional copies of which may be obtained at the Department of Public Information on the first floor of Main Building.

President Hetzel cited several instances why the College can no longer carry on its present program of work satisfactorily. The buildings are overcrowded and inadequate to meet the needs of the student body of four thousand. Vital scientific research work authorized and supported by the State and Nation is seriously hampered by unfit and inadequate buildings. The daily work of the College is being carried on in buildings that, in many cases, are obsolete in construction and dangerous to student occupancy. Several of the largest buildings must be replaced at once if the College will be able to further restrict its work, he said.

The College is unable to respond to the insistent public demand for larger service," the president continued, "be-

cause no other public institution of higher learning in the United States is compelled to reject so many qualified high school graduates. More than one thousand fully qualified applicants will be turned away from the State College this year, while over a period of five years two-thirds of the women applicants have been denied admission because of the lack of dormitory accommodations. Agriculture and industry demand increased research and extension service which cannot be rendered until more space is provided."

The President declared Pennsylvania to be lagging behind her sister States in providing facilities for higher education of her youth. In proportion to population, the enrollment in all Pennsylvania colleges and universities places this State twenty-second in the Union. Between the years of 1916 and 1927 Pennsylvania appropriated \$491,000 for buildings at her state college, while other States, for example Michigan, appropriated as high as \$18,000,000. The State of Pennsylvania has appropriated only \$2,678,840 to its State College for land and buildings during the years in which the College has been serving the Commonwealth.
