Doctor Peters Writes Article for Magazine

(Continued from first page) ly serving the population of the state In spite of the popular belief that Pennsylvania is oversupplied with colleges, the state is, in truth, far behind the average in the extent of provision for higher education

In his research work Doctor Peters has found that in Pennsylvania only 69 per cent of the population of college age are attending an institution of higher learning. The national average is 827 per cent, and the Keystone state stands twenty-second.

"Besides the southern states only eleven states provide for as small proportion of their sons and daughters as our commonwealth does. The consequence is that either many persons are deprived entirely from higher education or are driven to other states to get it," he avers.

Function of State College "A state college or university fulfills a sort of residuary function," he points out "It has the obligation to provide for all those of its sons and daughters who are left unprovided for by other institutions. To college the state college to perform this function so as to place our state on a par with other great states would not, therefore, involve encroaching

upon private colleges and universities In view of this fact Penn State has the friendly support of the executives of the other colleges in her request for a more adequate plant.

In explaining why the bond issue method is preferable in obtaining funds for the development of College buildings rather than any other, he states that the additional structures can be provided most efficiently and economically by an assured financial program extending over a period of years.

"If the bond issue fails in November," he concludes, "it will not be because of opposition, but by default. If the amendment fails thus by default this fall, it can not be put before the people again for vote until at least five years have elapsed. It is, therefore, important that every educator concerned to see Penn State and the State of Pennsylvania have the facilities needed for meeting her problems should not only himself vote for the bond issue in November but should also explain the need to other voters and urge their support."
