AGRICULTURAL LEADERS JUDGE AT COUNTY FAIRS

Staff Members Select Winners At Bloomsburg, Ligonier, And Conneautville

Prof Jacob M. Fry, assistant director of agriculture extension announced that six of Penn State's judging specialists will pick the winners at six fairs being held this week.

Poultry will be judged at the Columbia County fair at Bloomsburg by Mr. John Vandevort, head of poultry extension department. At the same fair, Mr. Lawrence C. Madison and Mr. C. A. Dunge will place the winners of the livestock exhibit while Mr. Roscoe R. Welch selects the pure dairy cattle. Mr. Nicholas Schmitz, director of agronomy extension, will judge crops.

Mr. Schmitz will also select the crops at the Conneautville exhibition while Mr. Edward B. Fitts, in charge

of dairy extension, or Mr. Robert H. Olmstead, will judge dairy cattle. Dairy cattle and livestock exhibits at Ligonier will accept the judgments of Mr. Charles R. Genhart and Mr. H. A. Willman.

Crops at the Lake Ariel Vocational school will be placed by W. H. Davis, county agent in Pike county. P. P. Kott, a county agent, will judge dairy cattle at the Levening County Vocational fair.

Pennsylvania National Guards To Hold Show At Boalsburg Sunday

Featuring Roman and Cossack riding, jumping, racing, and hurdling, the fifty-second machine gun squadron of the Pennsylvania National Guard will hold its annual horse show at Boalsburg from 9:30 a. m. to 5:15 p. m. Sunday.

Participating in the event are Troop A of Boalsburg, Troop B of Bellefonte, Troop C of Lewistown, and Headquarters Detachment of Tyrone. Preliminaries and eliminations will be held in the morning with the final commencing at one o'clock.

The competition is divided into three classes, being held for officers, privates, and non-commissioned men. Prizes which consist of cups and ribbons are being offered by the troops themselves. Admission to the horse show is free.
