knelt to Miller who was tackled in midfield. Miller failed to gain but Hannas and Diedrich tore off a first down on line plunges. After an exchange of punts Penn State held possession of the ball on its own 45-yard line as the quarter ended.

At the beginning of the second quarter Miller lost a yard at right end but Diedrich smashed through guard for 7 yards. Hannas ripped off 10 more at right tackle and Miller and Diedrich added 4 yards through the left side of the line. Hannas hit left tackle for a first down and Ed

Collins contributed 2 yards through center. Hannas and Miller made another first down and the ball rested on the 13-yard line. The latter duo carried the pigskin to the 3-yard mark for another first down. Hannas gained 2 yards at center and Diedrich, on the next play, scored a touchdown. Delp's kick for the extra point was blocked.

No further scoring resulted until the fourth period. Meanwhile, the Gettysburg backfield, led by McMillan and Spangler, gained steadily through Penn State's line and a possible score was averted by Miller's grounding a pass on the Lion's 2-yard line. After an exchange of punts during the last quarter, the visiting backfield began one of its marches down the field when it was suddenly interrupted by a fumble. Spangler, Bullet halfback, had gained 3 yards at tackle but fumbled the ball. Skip Stahley, speedy terminal, swooped down on the sphere and was across the goal line before the Gettysburg tacklers had realized what had happened. Diedrich failed to kick the goal.


