Outlook Encouraging

This is an encouraging promise of help for the next biennium, College officials believe. It is pointed out, however, that what the Pennsylvania State College needs is assured support for a building program which would endure for eight or ten years, and no State official can force the action of future legislatures.

Bond issue workers have declared throughout the campaign that only an act like the passage of Amendment No. 2 can give assurance of a fund sufficient to finance the sustained building program necessary to place Penn State on a par with her sister land-grant colleges. This statement was repeated more strongly upon hearing of the Governor's action. Governor Fisher's statement, however, is proof of the rising tide of public sentiment in favor of State College, it is asserted.

The Governor's statement was issued in response to Mr. Johnson's request that the State executive acquaint the voters with the facts concerning the proposed bond issues to come before the electorate at the election November 6.
