## Sires Travel in Luxury As Exhibition Cars Tour State for Farmers' Benefit

A big white car, a unit of the Beta Tau Special Train to be operated in the State of Pennsylvania by the New York Central Railroad in co-operation with Penn State and other organizations from October 29 to November 10 was shunted into the freight siding recently.

Ten coaches which will comprise the train, have been fitted up by the United States department of agriculture as well as local cattle clubs with booths and illustrations to impress the farmer with the benefits of good cattle breeding.

The special car will make several stops in each of the fifteen cattle breeding centers of the State. One

hundred pure-bred, registered young dairy sires of the Guernsey, Holstein and Jersey breeds will be consigned to the train during the tour.

These will be exchanged for scrub bulls or sold outright to farmers desiring to improve their herds. The importance of proper feeding of the cattle will also be stressed.

Prominent men in towns at which stops will be made have been scheduled to speak when the train arrives, and other features have been designed to attract attention. Providing arrangements can be made all programs will be broadcast over the radio in order to reach the farmers living outside the range of the special.

## GLEE CLUB TO OFFER VAUDEVILLE PROGRAM

Using the "Campus Owls," a student orchestra, and Jackson A. Martin '30 for specialty acts, the Penn State Glee Club will present a vaudeville show in Schwab auditorium Saturday night, November 10.
