Mechanical Engineers To Exhibit Machinery

Mechanical devices of almost every description will be on display in the Mechanical Engineering Laboratory as part of the Alumni Day exhibition tomorrow.

One of the donated exhibits is a full size Lycoming straight-eight engine with parts cut away to show the work of the moving parts. Another is a model of a steam boiler with glass sides showing the circulation of water and the process by which the steam is generated.

A carbolic ice machine will comprise an important part of the display. A drum of liquid carbon dioxide will be connected by a small tube to the apparatus which will make small discs of the solid carbolic ice.

Toots Panaccio and Jack Martin will serve at the tackle and guard posts, respectively, on the right side of the line. Red Duvall and John Zolotta will occupy the same posts on the left-side. Herb Eschbach is slated to start at center in place of Marty McAndrews. The latter and George Delp have been the victims of a shake-up and are forced to wage hard battles to regain their old posts.

The Lions' backfield appears to be Bealek's chief worry. In scrimmages during the week he relegated Tom Evans to the second team, using Frank Dredrich in his stead. Thus with Dredrich, Collins, Hamas and Miller composing the secondary defense, Penn State will oppose Syracuse with only one letterman in its backfield.

Evans, Wolff, French and McCracken will undoubtedly see action as the second backfield against the Hillmen tomorrow. Ricker and Shawley, injured regulars, may also see service at their posts on the line.
