### 'Keeper of Bees' Describes Winter Home of Insects

According to Penn State's "Keeper of the bees," Edwin J. Anderson, instructor in the entomology extension department, bees of the valley soon will begin their annual retirement which will be continued until the return of warm weather.

"An interesting bee activity, in the manner in which they protect themselves from the cold during the winter," said Dr. Anderson. "The circle which they form is quite characteristic of bee activities in general. A queen lays eggs in a circle, honey is deposited in an expanding circle, and the position of the bees in winter is also circular in form."

"When cold weather begins," he explained, "the bees of one colony all move to the center of their hive, and form a circle which is three or four inches thick, with a clearing in the center. One may judge the density of the bee population at this time by knowing that the entire colony of about 60,000 bees occupies this circle constructed in the position of the hive which is not filled with stored honey."

"A few bees in the center of the circle are engaged in feeding," continued Dr. Anderson. "Their activities generate the heat for the whole colony. Slowly the circle changes as bees from the outside move inward to take their turn at feeding and generating heat. A temperature always above 57 degrees F. is maintained. In zero weather it is not unusual to have

a temperature of 80 degrees in the hive." Mi. Anderson, who is an authority on bees, recently placed on the market a crystallized and crushed preparation of honey. This product known as "creamed honey" is a new article in Pennsylvania.
