Innovation in the school life at Penn State will be instituted this winter by the introduction of women cheerleaders at the men's intercollegiate basketball games in the new Recreation hall.

Mildred Wentz '31 will be the representative of the upper classes. With in the next week the two head cheerleaders of the men will make the final selection of at least two freshman girls for the cheer-leading position.

This new step is approved by Miss Charlotte E. Ray, dean of women, the Men's Athletic Association, and the men cheer leaders.

Health service and clinics are carried on in outlying villages, and a general program of health education is curtailing the spread of disease and materially aiding.

### Ag Students To Judge In Livestock Contest

Penn State has entered a team of six men in the International Intercollegiate Livestock Judging contest, and five men in the International Intercollegiate Meat Judging contest, both of which will be held at Chicago, December 1 to 8, it was announced yesterday.

The students who will represent the college in the livestock judging contest are Arthur G. Danks '29, John B. Pollock '30, Sam Kuntz '29, Evan P. Fowler '29, Homer V. Gifford '29, and Robert W. Zercher '29. Danks, Pollock, and Gifford, with the addition of Harlow H. Walker '30, will

be Penn State's judges in the meat judging contest. The livestock judging team is coached by Professor Franklin L. Bentley and Mansell F. Gimes, and Prof. Perceval T. Ziegler directs the meat judging group.

Thirty colleges will compete in the livestock judging contest and 15 institutions will be represented in the meat judging contest. The student judges will leave for Chicago Sunday, and will make stops at Delaware, Granville, New Castle, and Columbus, Ohio, for the purposes of inspection.

Three carloads of college livestock will be sent to the show. The shipments of animals, consisting of sheep, swine and beef cattle, will leave here November 24 and 26.
