Pitt and Western Reserve Vanquish Penn State Trios

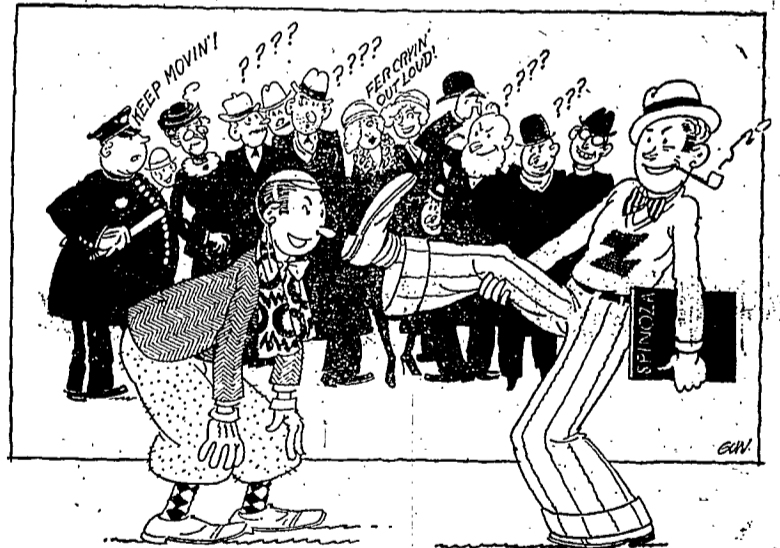

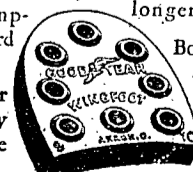
