(Continued from first page) will also be six shower rooms and an equal number of lavatories.

The building will consist of a basement and three floors, with service and storage rooms in the basement. In outward appearance it will be the same as the other unit of the quadrangle, Watts' Hall.

Other Construction

Work will be started on the new hot water unit some time this week, according to an announcement by the contractor. Service lines have already been laid, and the company hopes to have the digging done before the coming rains set in.

By the beginning of next month the first floor structure of the Grange dormitory for women will be ready. Structural steel is also being set for the first floor of the addition to the Pond Laboratory.

Work on the Main engineering building was started this week. At the present rate of progress the contractor hopes to be able to place the roof on the new structure by early spring.
