#### Lion Five Will Oppose Pitt Cagers Tomorrow

Five of them in their first scrimmage of the week Wednesday night. The varsity's passing was ragged and it also found it difficult to pierce the second-team defense. Fearful that his regulars might go stale for him, Dutch cut the practice short. Upon returning to the floor last night after a brief rest the first string quintet assumed an entirely different attitude. Forgetting altogether their recent defeats, they succeeded in breaking through the second team's barrier time after time for successful attempts at the basket. The Nittany dribblers will probably hold a light signal drill sometime today as the concluding practice before game time.

Three Regulars Play Last Game  
Three of Coach Hermann's regulars will make their last appearance in the Blue and White basketball toga tomorrow night against Pittsburgh. Captain Lou Reilly, Steve Hamas and Dick Reinhold are the trio that will be lost to the varsity through graduation in June. Artie Koch and Jack Browne will also be absent from next year's squad.

Captain Reilly will take up his work at the center position for the third and last time against a Panther quintet. Steve Hamas, who has seen action in as many Pitt frays, will pair off with Shippei Stahley in the defensive area. Should this guarding com-

binations repeat its actions of former contests at home it may toss a wrench in the Pitt scoring machinery. Dick Reinhold will answer the call at right forward for the last time as a pupil of Dutch Hermann. He will have as his running mate, Jack Mazess, agile sophomore dribbler, whose court tactics have been on the upgrade in recent practices. As substitute material the Nittany tutor will be able to rely upon the services of Jack Browne at center, Wally Leyda and Jack Meyers at the forwards posts, and Aitie Koch, Joe Wilson and Ed Lee at the guard berth.

Panthers Improve  
Since their first encounter with the Lions this season Coach Cliff Carlson's charges have improved greatly. The powerful West Virginia team that earlier in the year defeated Pitt, 40 to 35, was submeiged by the Golden Panther, 19 to 42, last week at Morgantown. Pittsburgh assumed the leadership at the outset of the tilt and retained it throughout.

The warriors of the Blue and Gold have thus far only five defeats to mar their otherwise successful season. On their Western trip they were conquered by Butler college, Northwestern and Wisconsin Notre Dame and West Virginia are the other teams who have succeeded in piercing the almost impregnable defense of the Carlson five. Fifteen college quintets have fallen before the terrific onslaught of the Golden Tornado. Iowa State, Indiana, Ohio State, Carnegie Tech, Waynesburg, Army, Rensselaer Poly Tech, Temple, Washington and Jefferson, West Virginia, Penn State, Grove City, Duquesne, Geneva, and Allegheny are numbered among the victims of the Panther ravages.

Formidable Pitt Line-up  
Coach Carlson has started the same combination in almost every game this season, and will no doubt continue his practices tomorrow. Captain Cy Wundelich will lead his teammates from the guard position while Charley Hyatt and Paul Zehfuss will be ready to get the tap-off from their forward positions. Chipper Hyatt, who scored 292 points last year, is endeavoring to surpass this mark and is now within

eighteen points of accomplishing that feat. He has scored on an average of fifteen points in each game. Zehfuss, who has been handicapped by illness during the greater part of the season, returned to the court in the West Virginia fray last week. Eddie Baker, a newcomer in the Panther cage tanks this year and a close follower of Hyatt in the scoring column, will receive the other guard assignment. Les Cohen will answer the call at the pivot post.

Lions Lose to Colgate  
After losing to Syracuse on Saturday the Nittany basketball team journeyed to Hamilton, N. Y., where they encountered defeat at the hands of a powerful Colgate university five, 24 to 20, Monday night. The Maroon team led, 14 to 12, at the close of the first-half and from then on remained aloof from any danger of a Nittany advance.

Captain Bolleman headed the scoring of both teams with five field goals and two fouls. Hagy, Colgate left forward, followed the lanky center with nine points, while Jack Mazess, leading scorer of the Penn State team, tossed three double-deckers and a penalty throw. Dick Reinhold tallied four fouls while Lou Reilly and Skip Stahley each accounted for a field goal and a foul.

In the final session Colgate outscored the Lion contingent twenty points to eight. It was in the second half that Bolleman tallied on four long shots and a penalty throw. Hagy, who was injured in the Bucknell game and was unable to play against the Lions earlier in the season, seemed

to bolster the Maroon team.
