Coach Spedel Resigns Wrestling Post Here

(Continued from first page)letic club, and of New Jersey for three years.

In addition to his work on the mats Coach Spedel is known for his work in recreation centers and in general physical education in New York city and in Newark, N. J. He has served as physical director in various normal schools in northern New Jersey.

In taking his position here in 1927 he eliminated Bayard Evans graduate of Penn State in 1921 and a former 155-pound intercollegiate champion who was also applying for the position. Spedel succeeded Ralph Leonard, coach for two years. Previous to Leonard, Dave Dotar coached the grapplers and brought several intercollegiate crowns to Penn State.

Since assuming his duties here the Lion coach has advanced the Nittany matmen from a fifth place, secured in the 1927 intercollegiate, to a second place this year. During his entire career here the Nittany wrestlers have lost only four dual meets, two with Iowa and two with Cornell. This year Cornell fell before the Penn State team.

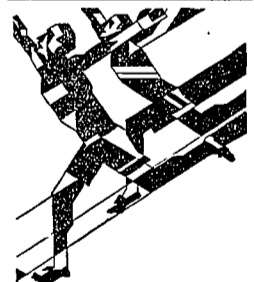
Good Record In 1927, Spedel's first year here, the grapplers won five out of the seven meets, defeating Lafayette, 26 to 3; Syracuse, 22 to 5; Harvard, 15 1/2 to 9 1/2; Navy 17 1/2 to 9 1/2 and Penn, 19 to 6, losing to Iowa 3 to 21 and Cornell 0 to 12.

In 1928 they again won five of the seven dual meets, defeating Alfred, 20 to 3; Penn 18 1/2 to 4 1/2; Lafayette 23 to 0; Syracuse, 17 to 6, and Navy 17 to 8, and lost to Iowa, 8 to 19 and to Cornell, 8 to 17.

The Lion wrestlers under his direction finished the past dual meet season without a defeat marked against them, scoring 160 points to 24 for their opponents.

Following the intercollegiate Saturday Coach Spedel left immediately with Cann for New York to make final arrangements for his new position there. He will work in a new \$10,000,000 structure built recently by the club.

(Continued from first page)amples exhibited by the anti-vivisectionists to show the needless waste of animal life. "What type of people are generally found in this category?" "Well," he replied, "many of the anti-vivisectionists are not extremely intelligent, but as a general rule the leaders are. The trouble is they usually let their emotions run away with them—in other words, they seem reluctant to figure the facts scientifically."

Doctor Dutcher is vitally interested in his calling. He is a champion of science and is constantly aiding its progress. He has a capable retinue of men under his guidance who are as intensely enthusiastic about the work of the department as he. "We are always conducting interesting experiments up here. Come up again," he said invitingly, "and I may have something more for you."

(Continued from first page)In the featherweight settee, the Lion entry will engage Haggerty, Georgetown 125-pounder who showed promise in his triumph over Hal The Fitzgerald, who easily defeated Kelly in the Navy fray, is slated to combat Lamocetti of M I T, while Schadel, Pennsylvania entry who also boasts a victory over Kolv, exchanges blows with Fletner of Western Maryland.

Penn State's heavyweight will meet a rugged foe in Captain Bolanos of M. I. T. in the opening round. Doug Cosby, who is a heavy favorite to annex the 185-pound crown for Western Maryland, will meet Madden of Georgetown, while Captain Pinsky of N. Y. U. and Williams of Navy, present title-holder, match boxing vets.

Syracuse's 145-pound entry, Doonin or Weeks, will meet Coach Leo Houck's welterweight in the preliminary round. Captain Winsor of Pennsylvania will trade blows with Gold of N. Y. U. in the opening match, while Jameson of M. I. T. and Hall of Navy display their talent. Charley Fish, Georgetown's hope for a title, and Fox of Western Maryland will clash in the preliminaries. Captain Norris of Western Maryland was forced out of the tourney by an injury.

Twenty-eight bouts, beginning at 7 o'clock Friday night, are scheduled for the preliminary round. Seven matches of the semi-final round will be held Saturday morning, beginning at 10.30 o'clock. The remaining seven bouts of the semi-finals will be fought after the dedication of Recreation Hall Saturday afternoon. Beginning at 7 o'clock Saturday night fourteen bouts, seven for first places, and seven for third places, will be held.

The Orange welterweight had the edge at long range punching in the first round, but Davis easily won the verdict by using a left jab and countering with a hard right effectively in the last two rounds. Davis is slated to meet the Syracuse entry in the preliminary round of the intercollegiate Friday night. Stan Kolakoski, encountered little difficulty in knocking out Hill, Syracuse leatherweight, early in the second round. The Orange 125-pounder was practically out on his feet at the close of the first session, and a two-fisted attack early in the second stanza finished him.

Julius Epstein's stiff left batterer Legge, Syracuse bantamweight, into submission in the first bout. The Lion flash pummeled his foe with a stiff jab throughout the three rounds to win the decision easily.

(Continued from first page) large time advantage over Broadhead, Princeton, to enter the semi-finals in the 175-pound class. The Nittany heavyweight had little difficulty in gaining a time advantage of 7 minutes and 43 seconds. Concluding the preliminary matches Pearce threw Baker of Columbia in 7 minutes and 17 seconds to give Penn State its only point score.

Semi-Finals The end of the semi-final round with only three men entered in the final matches found prospects for a high position poor. In the 115-pound bout in the semi-finals Flagg, after a difficult battle, subdued Steele for 3 minutes and gained the decision.

Captain Wilson and Lewis, Lehigh stars, were matched for the semi-final round. Both men put up a stubborn fight with neither one securing an advantage in the regulation bout. During the extra period, however, Wilson gained a time advantage of 2 minutes and 16 seconds. This placed the Lion leader in the final matches.

Johnson, Cornell football player and predicted champion, met Campbell in the 158-pound semi-final. Neither man would go to the mats until near the

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Eisenman and McConnell of Cornell next opposed each other with second place at stake. Eisenman was able to secure a 3 minute and 1 second time advantage during the middle of the bout.

Campbell, after his gruelling battle with Graham faced Clark of Columbia in the second place eliminations. After some wrestling Campbell gained a 5 minute and 23 second time advantage to win the bout easily.

In the last bout of the tourney Pearce and Barfield, Princeton, met the latter showing greater stamina and ability. The second-place challenger scored a 6 minute and 2 second time advantage or a win and 3 points.
