CLASS OF 1930

F. BRUCE BALDWIN

Statement: Realizing that the system of open Campus politics recently adopted by Student Council affords the candidate for office the opportunity to declare his intentions to the voters, enabling them to select more capable executives, the following aims are presented for your approval:

1. Student Government: We advocate the continuance and furtherance of policies of Student Government.
2. No \$5.00 Fee For Reports: We endorse a meeting between College Officials and a representative student group to investigate and reduce the five dollar fee for repeating a credit.
3. Phi Beta Kappa: We pledge our support and endorse plans started for the installation of a Phi Beta Kappa chapter at Penn State.
4. College Park: We support the plans for the transformation of the woodlot, between the Horticulture Building and New Beaver Field, into a College Park.
5. Out Policy: We earnestly believe in a policy leading to the betterment of existing conditions, Penn State traditions, Student Government, and good fellowship.

ARCHIBALD M. HOLMES

The President of the Senior Class has not sufficient authority invested in himself to effect radical changes in both College and Student traditions, customs and policies. He can, however, work for the improvement of existing conditions, to which the Students object, through the co-operation of both Student and Administrative groups.

With this view in mind, I wish to present for the approval of the Class of 1930, the following objectives, to which I pledge my entire support:

1. To continue the movement already begun to either remove the \$5 per credit fine for repeated courses or to substitute a more suitable plan in its stead.
2. To further the present system of open politics and to sponsor revisions, if necessary.
3. To try to effect a return to the former policy of the College, exempting all Seniors from final examinations. This may be accomplished through a study of the subject by an Administrative and Student Committee.
4. To sponsor "participating interest" in the athletic activity at Penn State, through the development of the latent possibilities of the Student Body.
5. To establish a uniform policy of cuts for Seniors, which can only be realized through the hearty co-operation of both the Student Body and Faculty.

WALLACE J. WOOD

1. Unprejudiced service: I pledge to the best of my ability to give an efficient administration of unprejudiced service to the class of 1930 and to Penn State.

2. Activities of non-fraternity men: A committee will be appointed to develop a plan which will stimulate and aid non-fraternity men in their activities.

Program: It is my purpose to do everything in my power that will increase the welfare of Penn State students, and to co-operate with the college administration, student groups, and organizations which look to this common objective.

CLASS OF 1931

LOHMER H. BROWN

1. We advocate the continuance of student government.
2. We advocate further improvement of winter sports development.
3. We advocate care for upper-classmen.
4. We advocate the use of the woodlot between the Horticulture Building and New Beaver Field for a College Park.
5. We advocate the repeal of the \$5.00 fines for repeated subjects.
6. We advocate a suitable meeting place for non-fraternity men.
7. We advocate better student-faculty relations.
8. We advocate a better system of grading.
9. We advocate the further development of intra-mural sports.
10. We advocate the continuation of the present vacation system.
11. We advocate the promotion of college spirit by enforcing customs.
12. We advocate closer relations with high schools and prep schools for the purpose of interesting activity men in Penn State.
13. We advocate the furtherance of college "get-togethers" as illustrated by the Freshman Carnival.

STERLING E. BROWN

1. I advocate a constructive attempt to have the Board of Trustees authorize student ownership and operation of automobiles.
2. I advocate a policy of unlimited cuts for Seniors in correspondence with the attitude adopted by other leading universities.
3. I advocate clarification of the Freshman customs; the elimination of obsolete and purposeless customs, and in the placing of the entire code upon a collegiate basis.
4. I advocate that, without changing the number of credits needed to graduate, the R. O. T. C. course be given a three credit rating. Also I urge that a study of the situation be made in an effort to make the course more attractive.
5. I advocate the endorsement of the college and the male students for the rapid establishment of societies in Pennsylvania State College.
6. I advocate the establishment of 11 national honor societies possible in Penn State, and especially commend the efforts of the faculty committee in the attempt to gain a Phi Beta Kappa charter.
7. I advocate the placing of college politics, etc., on a democratic basis which shall no cognizance of fraternal affiliation, but shall depend rather upon ability and merit.
8. I advocate the continuance and renewed support of the student body of an entertainment course similar to the one sponsored by the Y. M. C. A.

EARLE L. EDWARDS

1. Appointments: As a member of no clique, I will be able to employ the principle power of the Junior Class president, that of appointing men to the leadership of class enterprises, without regard to political debts or affiliations; instead, basing my appointments upon the merit and ability of the men in question.
2. Freshman Jurisdiction: The second power of the Junior Class president lies in the correct administration of freshman class affairs. Correct fulfillment of this duty would be a powerful factor in raising freshman standards of Penn State loyalty. Phases of the freshman problem needing immediate attention are: (a) Adequate custom revision and enforcement; (b) Thorough education in Penn State principles and traditions.
3. Support of plans beneficial to the Student Body: Although the Junior Class president cannot, by his individual efforts, make startling changes in the present system of student conduct, nevertheless I promise, if elected, to do all in my power to advance the changes favored by the student body.

EVAN C. REESE

1. Freshman class meetings: We believe in more frequent and better class meetings for Freshmen to stimulate more College Spirit and to develop interest in activities.
2. Continuation of election reform: It is our desire to see politics at Penn State placed on a higher level and a more open basis.
3. Enlargement of winter sports park: We think it necessary to further develop the program already under way.
4. Enforcement of Freshman and Sophomore customs: To endeavor to eliminate all antiquated customs and to strictly enforce all those retained.
5. Recognition of non-fraternity men in activities: We propose that non-fraternity men should be given more consideration in all activities, especially social activities.
6. Sport managers: We advocate a new system of election of managerial positions.
7. Itemized statement of the Junior Prom: We uphold the publication of an itemized statement of all expenditures of the Junior Prom.
8. Student committee on curricula: To establish a wider range of elective courses for Junior year.

CLASS OF 1932

J. B. HENRY

1. I favor non-compulsory R. O. T. C.
2. Modification of Sophomore customs.
3. More recognition of non-fraternity men in class activities.
4. Co-operation with the Y. M. C. A.
5. Promotion of interest in class sports and mass athletics.
6. Formation of a student curriculum committee.

GEORGE J. SMART

1. Modification of present customs to the extent of the abolishment of meaningless and purposeless Freshman rules.

Recognizing the fact that non-fraternity men have no suitable place in which to spend their spare hours, we advocate the establishment of Club rooms for them.

Young, but Bendigo singled sending Patrio to second. Zappia's home run, injected at this point, scored three runs to place the visitors in the lead. The side was led by Pielia fluid out to Young and Disney grounded to French. Dietrich failed to reach base safely in the second half of the frame, but Young singled and Seltzman rapped out a one-base hit to right field. Drill, batting for Fry, hit into a double play to end the period.

Lockard was in the box for the Bendigians at the opening of the fifth. Jacks, Dennis, and Albright went out in succession. With the bases unoccupied Coop French bled the count in a home run deep into left field. Dobbelaar followed Coop's blow with a double into the same garden, but failed to score when Delp, Wolf, and Singley were retired in order.

A single by Zappia opened the seventh period. Lockard nabbed Pielia's tap for the first out and Disney's long fly to right field was taken by Dietrich for the second put-out. Stuart, batting for Dennis, smacked a single sending Zappia over the plate and placing the Annville team in the lead. Albright failed to reach first grounding out to French. Livezey, hitting for Lockard, singled but the Penn State team failed to score in their half when Wolf flied out with Livezey and Delp on base.

With Stokes pitching for the Lions at the beginning of the eighth the Valley team failed to score although two hits were garnered from the Nittany hurler. Singley's one base hit in the second half of the eighth opened the way for the final Nittany tally when Young singled after Wolf had popped out to Bendigo.

Disney flied to Dietrich to open the ninth frame for the Lebanon Valley combination. Jacks went to first when one of Stokes' pitched balls hit him. Stuart rapped out a single sending Jacks to third but was out on second on a fielder's choice of Albright's tap. Jacks scored the winning run of the game when one of Stokes' pitches escaped Seltzman.

With Dobbelaar and Delp on base in the last half of the inning Wolf and Singley failed to hit safely retiring the Lions scoreless.
