Musser to Throw Javelin

Completing the Nittany representatives in the middle distance events, Coach Cartmell has entered King in the half and mile, Rekers in the mile, and Detwiler in the 2-mile. The group will give Penn State one of the strongest distance contingents in the competition.

Dan Musser, holder of the College javelin record of 191 feet 2 inch, will compete in the javelin throw. While not having hurled the spear as far as several of the entrants, Dan has a chance for one of the places Churchill and Curtice of California have already thrown the javelin more than 200 feet. Other outstanding men are Myers of N. Y. U. and Kibby of Stanford.

For the weight events Coach Cartmell has selected Red Merrill and Cal Shawley. Both will throw the hammer, while Cal will also enter the discus competition. Marzocco and Fullerton, clearing the low hurdles, complete the Penn State entry list.

Strong Stanford Squad

Stanford is picked by experts as the overwhelming favorite. The California institution has won the championship for the last two years, and her strength in both the field and track events gives her a large margin over the other teams.

Eric Krenz, Stanford, is conceded the discus crown for the second time on the basis of his recent shattering of the world's record by more than five feet. His teammate Rother is favored to supplant him in the shot put, having beaten Krenz consistently and bettered the college mark.

Lions Compete in IC-4A Track Meet Eighteenth Time

Lion competition in the I. C. A. A. A. championships today and tomorrow will mark Penn State's eighteenth entry in the meet. The first entry was in 1911, when the College was admitted to membership in the association.

Nittany runners amassed their greatest point total in 1927 when they scored 27 to place second. Since Coach Nate Cartmell's advent here in 1923, the team has compiled twice as many markers as in the eleven preceding years. The championship results follow:
