

Lacrosse Team Loses to Army Twelve, 2-1; Temple Overcomes Batters, 13-9

STUBBORN DEFENSE WINS FOR CADETS

Koth Scores Lone Nittany Tally As West Pointers Earn Scant Decision

By successfully withstanding a barrage of shots unloosed by Penn State's fighting lacrosse men, Army's stubborn defense gained the Cadets a scant 2-to-1 victory over Coach Ernie Paul's stickmen on New Beaver field Saturday afternoon.

Led by Goldberg, outstanding collegiate goalie, the West Point defense men checked all but one of the Nittany team's scoring thrusts. Twelve minutes after the referee's whistle had opened one of the most hotly-contested lacrosse games ever staged on New Beaver field, Koth, Lion third defense, sent the ball into the net after receiving a shot pass from Captain Ted Tack at in-home.

Every other Penn State scoring attempt was either blocked by Goldberg or effectively smothered by Army's fierce defense.

Army Opens Scoring

Taking the ball from center at the outset of the game, the Lion attack worked the pellet to within scoring distance but lost the ball on an intercepted pass. On the next play, Diaper, Army out-home, took the ball near his own goal, ran it down the full length of the field and tossed a shot pass to O'Keefe at in-home.

O'Keefe was but a few paces from the Nittany goal, and sent the ball past Bud Kaiser, Lion goalie, to annex Army's initial marker. The ball remained in mid-field for the next ten minutes with neither team possessing the advantage until Koth scored Penn State's sole point.

In a shot scrimmage near the Nittany goal, Sladen, Army attack man found an opening in the Lion's defense and sent a hard grounder into the nets to score his team's second point. During the remaining minutes of the half, the ball was in Penn State's possession but few shots were attempted.

Coming back in the second half, the Lion offense was renewed with increased vigor while Army's attack was impotent before the impenetrable defense put up by the Nittany team. The few drives of the Army twelve were halted by the effective Lion defense led by Steve Hannas and Skip Stahley.

Four Temple runs scored in the ninth inning gave the Owl batsmen a 13-to-9 victory over the Penn State nine in the final home game of the season on New Beaver field Saturday afternoon.

Failure to hit with men on base cost the Lion machine several runs. Red Fry started the contest on the mound for the Nittany army but was relieved by Harold Stokes in the third frame. Cooper, Owl ace, occupied the mound for the visitors but gave way in the third to Hoehsler who finished the game for the Philadelphians.

The visitors opened the scoring with four runs in the first inning and added runs to their total in the third, fourth, seventh, and ninth frames. The Lion counted in the first, second, third, eighth, and ninth periods. Temple batters scored thirteen hits from the Nittany moundsman while the Lion hitters clouted eleven safeties during the contest.

Four successive singles in the first of the ninth resulted in a quartet of Temple runs before the inning ended. Yutz Dieckel pounded out a home run in the Nittany half bringing the final count to nine runs. The side was retired without further scoring, however.

Joe Hickey, of New York university, passed George in the final stretch while Johnny Gore of Princeton passed George just before he reached the tape to take second. The time for this race was 1:21.2-5. In the field events, Musser, Morrill and Shawley failed to score while other Lion entries did not place.
