Melville Van Seters '29, Charles S. Harper '31, Robert M. Hipple '31, Herbert G. Sapper '30, Robert H. Jackson '30, and Maurice C. Barnhart '31, comprise the chorus.

Special Orchestra

"For no reason at all," was Mousa's answer when asked why he had been detained in the prison for three months. He spent the three months in company with four thousand other prisoners, three thousand of whom were students.

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"Not until I was released did I know why I had been detained there," Mousa explained. "It was in 1918, just following the World War. The nations of the world were soon to convene for a peace conference. The Egyptian people, chiefly the students, were clamoring for representation. The feeling was so great that there were several outbreaks. To maintain peace, the government arrested thousands of persons and cast them into prison."

"One day I was on my way to school. I was only fourteen years old at the time. The first thing that I knew a cop had hold of me, and I was headed for the city hall. After being kept there for a few hours I was removed to the jail."

"What a jail that was! On the floor were at least six inches of dust, packed tightly. We were hungry most of the time. Several prisoners got tuberculosis."

"My family did not know where I was until I had been in the jail for three days. They knew that one of two things had happened to me, that I had been killed or imprisoned. The third day I was able to send a letter to my mother."
