

BEZDEK TO TEACH FOOTBALL COURSE

Grid Mentor Will Train Coaches With Assistance of Bob Higgins, Loeffler

A summer course in football coaching will begin here tomorrow as a part of the regular instruction under the tutelage of Hugo Bezdek, director of athletics and head football coach, and Bob Higgins, assistant coach.

This course will run for three weeks and will be followed by a three weeks' course in basketball coaching. The latter course will be in charge of Kenneth D Loeffler, a former Penn State court star.

Both sections of the course are designed for coaches in high schools, normal schools, colleges, and for members of faculties of such institutions whose duties require them to supervise coaching.

Trained Star Athletes

Bez, in carrying out his assignment, will have full opportunity to display the coaching talent that made his teams noted for steady playing. Although handicapped by the gradual loss of scholarship men in the last two years, the Nittany coach has maintained the varsity caliber equal to that of other Eastern colleges and universities.

The football mentor is a graduate of the University of Chicago, having been a teammate of Coach Steffen of Pitt and a grid student of the noted Alonzo Stagg. He also managed the Pittsburgh team in the National League for several years.

Before coming to Penn State, Bez was coach at the University of Oregon. He has been here since before the World War and has trained such luminaries as Glenn Killinger, Hinkey James, Harry Wilson, and others.

shop in the basement. This portion of the hall will also contain a complete dispensary service, dramatic rehearsal room, and men's lounge.

All student activities and the College administrative offices will be centered within the walls of the rebuilt Old Main. College officials believe that this will continue to preserve the tradition that Old Main is the heart of the College.

To Have Memorial Lounge

The entrance to the new building will be guarded by an imposing row of pillars reaching the fourth floor. Old Main's ancient stone will flank the wide doorway, making the exterior walls and windows look much the same as in the present structure.

A spacious lobby will occupy the front section of the first floor with twelve columns rising to the base of the third floor. Located about in the same position that Old Chapel now occupies will be an immense memorial lounge.

At the rear of the main memorial lounge will be an imposing entrance

to where formerly stood the platform of Old Chapel. The lounge will be decorated with pictures and objects that tell the story of Penn State from its early beginning.

The office of the Dean of Men will be located where the College treasurer formerly had his stand, while across the way the Athletic Association will have its offices. The treasurer will be stationed in the former office of the Alumni Association.

Publication Rooms

At the extreme eastern end of the first floor there will be an alumni reception room equipped with lounges, chairs, and fireplace. The remainder of the floor will be taken up by news service rooms and offices.

On the second floor the President's suite, consisting of a board room and secretaries' rooms, will be situated. The business quarters of the College, including the rooms of the Comptroller, Purchasing Agent and others, will be on the same floor.

On the third and fourth floors will be found the heart of student activities. The Student Union idea adopted so successfully at other institutions will be thoroughly carried out, making Old Main the home of extracurricular activities.

A large assembly room and various undergraduate publication offices will take up most of the third floor. Student Board and Student Council as well as the Y. M. C. A. and student pastors will also be located here. The floor above will contain a meeting room for campus societies and a large band-practice room. Space for theatrical coaching will also be provided for on that floor, while the rest will be devoted to class rooms.
