VETERAN BOOTERS BEGIN WORKOUTS

Experienced Varsity and Plebe Candidates Report for Soccer Practice

Ten lettermen, four experienced substitutes, and twelve booters, who earned their numerals as freshmen last fall, participated in the first organized pre-season workout of the Nittany specimen on the old lacrosse practice field last night.

Coach Jeffries expects to complete his squad this week following the arrival of several booters who have not as yet reported. McKune, a booter from Johannesburg, South Africa, outstanding plebe last year is expected to arrive tomorrow. Jeffries believes that the promising plebe will develop into a first string aspirant.

Harvey, Allen and Hutchinson, all varsity fullbacks, went through the limbering up exercises yesterday in good form. Harvey is a veteran of several campaigns, while Hutchinson earned his letter last year when Allen was forced to leave his varsity berth because of injuries.

Forward Material Reports

Three veterans, McLaren, Edgerton and Strimlin, will also vie for the halfback posts. Edgerton was selected by leading mentors for the mythical All-American eleven two successive seasons. Strimlin is the only remaining soccer candidate who was a member of the championship team in 1928. Since he did not attend College last year, he will be an eligible athlete this season.

Material for Bill Jeffries' forward wall includes Skinnel, Grammar, Anderson and Lutz, all earners of the varsity "S". Travis, Meiselman and Miller are experienced candidates for the Lion machine who have not yet received letters. The aspirants for the forward positions is completed by Debonis, Tyson, Shepard, Masters, Young and Batterby, all of last fall's freshmen aggregation. Backs Hartzler, Henszey, Clare, Vyversburg, Shea and Shaw are also recruits from the first year squad.

PLEBE GRIDDERS PRACTICE TODAY

To Hold First Session at 4 O'clock This Afternoon—125 Sign Up For Yearling Team

With the opening practice scheduled for 4 o'clock this afternoon on New Beaver practice field, Coach Dutch Hermann begins the task of moulding his 1929 freshman grid aggregation from the 125 candidates reporting last week.

Eighty-one of the most promising yearlings have been issued uniforms. Although the opening game with Syracuse freshmen will not be played until November 9, Coach Hermann intends to hold daily practice sessions. The material reporting at the meetings held yesterday, Friday and Saturday, is of practically the same calibre as last year with the number of candidates approximately the same.

A number of high and prep school stars have already reported while the outlook for this season will be indicated by the showing made in practice this week.

LIONS TO MEET COLGATE GRIDDERS IN 3 BATTLES

Penn State football teams will meet gridiron representatives of Colgate university in 1930, 1931, and 1932 according to Neil M. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics at Penn State.

The New York institution has contracted to meet the Lions on New Beaver field next year and in 1931 while the Nittany warriors will journey to Hamilton to meet the Maroon array in 1932. Next year's encounter will be played Alumni Homecoming day October 26.

Lion gridders have not faced football representatives of Colgate since 1911 when the Maroon team met defeat at the hands of the Blue and White aggregation by an 18-to-9 score at State College.
