

Booters Will Meet Haverford; Harriers Open Championship Drive Tomorrow

FACE UNDEFEATED FOES TOMORROW

Veteran Lineup To Encounter Twice Tied Opponents on New Beaver Field

In a third effort to decide supremacy between Penn State and Haverford soccermen, a veteran Lion eleven will battle the undefeated Scatlet and Black booters on the football practice field at 1 o'clock tomorrow. In the last two years, the only clashes between the teams resulted in scoreless ties.

The Nittany booters will face their opening test and also the first league game of the season, while the Haverfordians won several practice tilts as well as their league encounter with Lehigh. The first intercollegiate battle of the McPete coached dribblers resulted in a victory over Western Maryland 8-to-1. Lehigh fell before the Haverfordian onslaught 12-to-2.

Veterans To Start
Frazier, Scatlet and Black captain and right halfback, has had outstanding in the opening matches. Frazier was an Olympic team candidate. Richie and Longacre, right inside and center forward, are high scorers for the Haverford aggregation.

Gerson or McKane will start at goal for the Lion booters, while Hutcheson or Harvey will receive the assignment at right fullback. Allen will probably play in the left fullback post. Captain McLaren will cover his right halfback position. Egeiton at center half and Strimlan at left half complete the veteran backfield.

The outside right berth will be filled by Lutz and Travis will start at inside right. Coach Jeffrey believes he has found a combination which will strengthen the center of the line by using Debonis or Skinnell at center forward and Meiselman or Gramhar at inside left to assist Travis at the center attack. Anderson will play outside left.

back positions. La Mark will start at fullback for the New Yorkers. Scoring 34 points against Vermont in the opening game Beryl Follet has proven himself the Violet team's most dangerous scoring threat. La Mark and Jones came to this year's squad from the 1928 freshman team.

With the exception of placing Red Evans at the quarterback position in the place of Captain Jack Martin, Coach Bezdek will start the same Nittany line-up against the New York team that opened the game against Marshall Saturday. Evans' ability to carry the ball combined with his speed and defensive ability have earned him a place on the varsity.

Earle Edwards and Meyer Kaplan will start at ends with Toots Panuccio and Cal Shawley at the tackle berths. Johnny Zoiella and Dutch Ricker will be at guards while Herb Eschbach will receive the center assignment. Coop French and Yur' Diedrich will start at the halfback posts with Judy Lasich assuming his regular duties at fullback. French will call signals from his position at halfback.

Attempting to add to the power displayed by the Lion team Saturday Coach Bezdek has been putting his changes through strenuous scrimmages during practice sessions this week. The varsity team gained consistently through the determined resistance of the scrub team frequently crossing the reserve goal line.

Tomorrow's encounter will be the second meeting between New York university and Penn State on the gridiron. The Lions first met the Violet team in 1927 when they held the New Yorkers to a 13-to-13 tie on New Beaver field.
