

Bezdek Appears in Personality Sketch

In an article entitled "Schoolmaster of the Football Field" appearing in the Sunday magazine section of the New York Times, short personality sketches of Athletic Director Hugo Bezdek and twelve other coaches are presented.

"Hugo is built like a wardrobe trunk," the portion devoted to Bezdek reads. "He has had his troubles in recent years and his soul seems saddened but he brightens up when his team wins. He speaks slowly and heavily, seeming to chew his words as he goes along, but he can tell a good story when he forgets himself. He is deadly serious in his work but otherwise extremely amiable. He was once a big league baseball manager but later reported. Like most men of unusual physical strength, he is as gentle as a kitten unless aroused by some incident that calls for immediate action. He has been the target for alumni grumbling in some quarters, but the boys who have played for him at Penn State are with him unambiguously and to a finish. That should be convincing evidence as to his capability and his character."

"LIBERALITY IS IMPORTANT," SAYS COLLEGE PRESIDENT

ENGINEERS BEGIN EXPANSION WORK

Extension Department Opens Drive To Develop Greater Service In Range Of Teaching

Entering upon a program of extensive expansion resulting from plans inaugurated at the fourteenth annual convention held here during the summer, the engineering extension department has opened a drive for greater service, states Prof. John O. Keller, head of the department.

Branch schools with an enrollment of six hundred students have been established in Erie, Reading, Allentown, Wilkesbarre, and Scranton, offering three year courses in aeronautical, mechanical, electrical, industrial, and textile engineering. In addition seven night schools with an enrollment of 1500 are now being organized in anthracite cities for the purpose of training miners.

The home study department offers over a hundred courses in high school and college work. Several new courses have been added to this division, including aviation, slide rule operation, wood and lumber, and advanced radio. Foreman conference groups operated by the department train men in leadership of the various plants through out the state.

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
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
