

### SENIORS PROPOSE UNLIMITED CUTS

endeavor to maintain high marks, and thus enjoy the privileges of cutting in their final year," he maintained.

Under the system proposed by Wolfe, only seniors with an average of 18 or better for their three years would be eligible to cut without limitations. He stated that responsibility for attending classes should remain with the individual student.

McAndrews, A. A. president and captain of the champion Nittany team, approved the project, but did not favor the honor list as adopted at some colleges using the system. He said in part:

"Seniors must learn to adopt responsibility as part of their education, and this plan would be one way in which to promote that character. It is not adopted as this would be an injustice. However, the honor roll should attempt to detect the purpose of the entire movement."

After students have been in college three years, McAndrews believes they have learned not to abuse their privileges. In his statement he said that the desire to graduate would aid in preventing undue cutting by seniors.

ified their intention to root for Penn State from the sidelines tomorrow afternoon.

#### Team Records

Neither team is favored in the pre-game predictions of Philadelphia sports writers. Both teams displayed more power in their victories last Saturday than at any previous time this year. It is conceded by the rival schools. Student enthusiasm at both schools reached its highest pitch after those wins, thus assuring spectators of a "Battle of Cheers" tomorrow.

Both teams are defeated, Penn falling before California, 12-to-6, and Penn State before N. Y. U., 7-to-0. Penn's major victories were scored over Lehigh, 10-to-7, and over Navy, 7-to-2, while the Lions triumphed over Lafayette, 6-to-3, and over Syracuse, 6-to-1.

While Penn has had the upper hand since relations were opened with Penn State, the Lions have divided honors with the Quakers since Beal took over the helm in 1920. Since 1920 each team has triumphed three times, with a scoreless tie in 1921, and no game in 1925.

Last year the Quakers won, 11-to-0, but the year before Captain John Ruppke and his mates surprised with a 20-to-0 conquest. In 1926 Paul Sullivan's drop-kick defeated the Lions, 1-to-0, and in 1922 the Quakers ruled, 7-to-6. The Lions won handsily in 1920 by a 28-to-7 count, and again in 1923 by a 21-to-0 score.

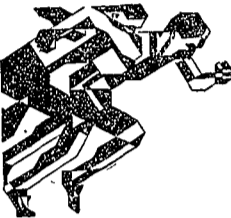

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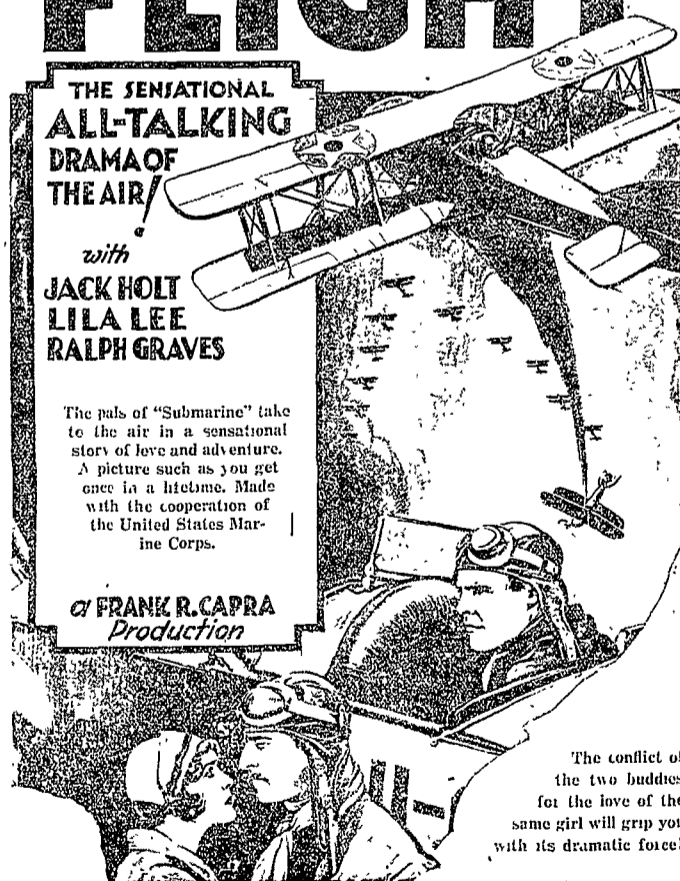
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
