

### MARKSMEN ENGAGE MAINE RIFLE TEAM

#### Burrows Makes High Score in Victory over New York Stock Exchange

Opposing University of Maine, Penn State's rifle team began the second telegraphic match of the fall season Wednesday. The meet will not be completed until this afternoon, with the final results being computed next week.

Defeating New York Stock Exchange 1812 to 1772, the team opened its season last week although the returns were not received until yesterday.

James S. Burrows '30 was high scorer against the New York team, making 780 out of a possible 1000 points. Other members of the team who figured in the scoring made the following records: Gordon H. Putham '30 12, Eugene P. Sykes '31, 553, Oran F. Hunt '32, 351, John Nichols '32, 318.

Four rifle teams will represent Penn State during the coming year. Besides the regular varsity and R. O. T. C. team, a freshman squad and a woman's team have been organized and will engage in dual matches.

On January 18 the varsity will journey to Annapolis, Md., where they will meet the Navy in a shoulder-to-shoulder contest. A match has also been scheduled with Gettysburg, and a number of other meets have been tentatively arranged.

The freshman have scheduled a match with University of Maryland and the woman's rifle manager, Mary E. Keislake '30, is arranging several meets for the co-ed team.

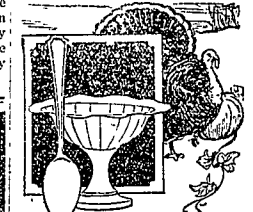
