

Soccermen Elect Hutchinson Captain; Wrestlers Report for Pre-Season Drills

17 BOOTERS GAIN VARSITY LETTERS

Manager May Schedule Lehigh, Princeton for Contests in 1930 Campaign

Pointing to the fifth championship campaign of the Intercollegiate Soccer association, the Lion booters elected Bill Hutchinson, fullback, captain of the 1929 eleven. Fourteen major awards were issued to twelve members of the 1929 championship team, manager, and Ray Viverberg, at the elections session Tuesday night.

Special awards of a minor letter were made to three other members of the squad. The major letters were received by McKune, goalie, Harvey and Allen, fullbacks, and Strimlin, Edgerton, and Captain MacLaren, halfbacks. Linehmen who were recognized as members of the undefeated team and rewarded with a major 'S' are Lutz, outside right, Skinnell, inside right, Debonis, center forward, Travis, inside left, and Anderson, outside left.

Masters for meritorious work as utility inside linemen, where he gained a permanent position early in the season, also received a major award, as well as manager John L. Gans '30. An honorary major letter was awarded to Ray Viverberg, first string halfback who died during the season.

Arrange Tentative Schedule

The special awards of the association football 'S' were received by Captain-elect Hutchinson, Grammar, and Meiselman. Hutchinson stands out among the three booters of varsity calibre who were crowded from a post on the eleven by keen competition.

Negotiations for next season's soccer schedule resulted in tentative arrangements with Haverford for a game in Haverford on October 13. Cornell was unable to play here for the Homecoming engagement October 25, and Lehigh or Swarthmore may be obtained for the open date.

Efforts to place Princeton on the Lion schedule may culminate in 1930 with a game November 1. Syracuse will face the Nittany booters for the Pennsylvania Day attraction on November 8. Penn has been slated for a game November 15 in Philadelphia and negotiations are under way to complete arrangements for a tilt with Lafayette on November 13 enroute to the Quaker city.

2 BOXING MANAGERS WILL TRY FOR TEAM

Tiring of managerial duties Frank Ginsburg and Ken FitzSimmons, last year's first assistant boxing managers, have donned the leather gloves and are working out with Coach Leo Houck's 1930 mitt team.

150 TURN OUT FOR YEARLING QUINTET

Plebes Open Season With Wyoming Seminary January 15—Will Play Six Games

With 150 freshman candidates reporting to Coach Larry Conover, practice for the plebe basketball campaign began Wednesday night in Recreation hall. The yearling quintet will play a six-game schedule, opening the season January 25 with Wyoming seminary, if officially approved.

Three other games have been definitely scheduled for the Lion freshmen. They will meet Colgate at Hamilton, N. Y. on February 23, Syracuse at Syracuse, March 1, and Pittsburgh at State College March 15. All of these games will precede varsity contests with the same schools.

Tentative plans for two other games have been completed which will probably be with Carnegie Tech and Bucknell. In the event that one of these teams cannot play here, a game may be arranged with the Pittsburgh junior college of Johnstown.

Coach Conover has found some promising material among the yearlings and most of the candidates have had previous high school experience. The large squad has already been divided into groups and sent through short "test" scrimmages. Next week the number of players will be considerably reduced with a squad of twenty being picked after the holidays.

3 LETTERMEN AID IN BUILDING TEAM

Lack of Lightweights Handicaps Coach Speidel—100 Report For First Practice

With three lettermen from last year's team forming the nucleus of the 1930 wrestling squad, Coach Charlie Speidel early this week began drilling his group of nearly 100 candidates in preparation for the coming season's campaign.

The brunt of this year's work will rest on the shoulders of Captain Hal Hubler and Campbell, both runners-up in last year's intercollegiate competition. Pearce, experienced 175-pounder, will aid in carrying part of the burden during the coming season.

Coach Speidel is seriously handicapped by a lack of lightweights occasioned by the loss through graduation of Captain Ted Wilson, last year's 125-pound intercollegiate champion, and Don Steele, versatile 115-pounder.

Four men lost this year. "Chuck" Eisenman, vacating the 145-pound berth after two years on the team, is ineligible because of three year's varsity competition. Another place is left open on the team through the absence of "Tiny" Cranmer, former heavyweight defender.

Of the crowd of candidates reporting for the 115-pound class, Harkins and Paxton, both newcomers, stand out at present. Cowell, slightly experienced in intercollegiate ranks, and Davenport are dividing honors in the next higher class.

Captain Hubler after two years of varsity work is being strongly contested for the 135-pound berth by Stein, promising newcomer. In the 145-pound group Transue and Kaiser are waging an evenly-fought fight for honors.

Reybitz, sensational star on last year's freshman team, is contesting Campbell for a place in his division. Paul Long, Sepic, and Andy Parana are waging a neck-in-neck fight for places in the 165-pound group.

Heavyweights seem to be plentiful with Pearce, Storch, Wahl, Gillard, and Fisher standing above all other contenders in this rank.

RUTGERS TEAM USES 'NO CAPTAIN' SYSTEM

Rutgers university football team elected R. Bernard Crowl as honorary captain of the 1929 football team Monday. Crowl has acted as captain during the season.

Under the system in effect at Rutgers, acting captains are appointed by the coach. At the end of the season, honorary captains are elected by the letter men. This is the same system that has been adopted by Carnegie Tech and Ohio State university.

CENTER PROBLEM CONFRONTS COACH

Pivot Men's Inexperience Faces Court Mentor—Sufficient Material Available

Although a wealth of center material is available Coach Dutch Hermann must cope with the problem of inexperience in developing a varsity pivot man for the Lion varsity basketball five.

With the graduation of Jack Browne, understudy to Captain Lou Reilly, who also graduated in June, no center experienced in intercollegiate competition was left to the Nittany squad. Five sophomores alone have seen action in scrimmages this week at the pivot post as Hermann shifts the center candidates about in an effort to find the most promising candidates.

Sophomore Centers Outstanding Hamilton, burly sophomore griddler, has shown up well in scrimmage. While at West Philadelphia high school he played center and alternated with Fred Brand at the pivot post on last year's plebe quintet. Brand, though lacking in experience, has improved in recent practice sessions. Hammond, also a freshman center

COURT COACHES ADVOCATE NEW OUT-OF-BOUNDS SYSTEM

In order that a basketball team whose center is smaller than his opponent will not be at a disadvantage, court coaches are advocating putting the ball in play from the out-of-bounds line instead of from the customary center position.

When a team has scored a basket, the quintet scored upon will put the ball in play from the out-of-bounds line beneath its own basket.

EXPECT FEW GRID CHANGES

That there will be few changes in the football rules for next year is the opinion of Edward K. Hall, chairman of the National Football Rules committee. He is certain that the rule forbidding running with a fumbled ball will still be on the books next football season.

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
