improvement. "However, I realize that it is difficult to abolish a bad practice without proposing an effective substitute," he stated. "Fraternity men desire some sort of extraordinary activity or horse-play by the pledges as a pre-imitation duty. A satisfactory substitute for a rough, dangerous initiation is an impromptu vaudeville show by the pledges which gives the spectators the opportunity to 'jazz' the pledges but also has no harmful effects."

He also agreed with proposals of Dean Stoddard of the Liberal Arts school, Prof. Charles W. Beebe, chairman of the fraternity advisory council, and Malcolm Kirkpatrick '30, interfraternity council head, that a more detailed study of the fraternities' history and ideals would prove a satisfactory substitute.

Fraternities may be inducted for rough initiation tactics on three counts, the Dean believes. These are a ridiculous opinion in the eyes of the general public, a lessening of the serious note of initiation, and a vital distraction to scholastic effort.

Former Chaplain Scores 'Hell Week' Dean of Men Frazier Metzger of Rutgers university, former College chaplain, writes that "Hell Week" has a serious effect upon the mental well-being of the pledge. Advocating abolition of rough initiations, he says:

"An orderly custom of initiation with sane methods and emphasizing the pleasure and dignity of becoming a fraternity man is all that is necessary. An appreciation of college spirit can be built up only by some kind of substantial order, which is in no sense found in the childish methods pursued at present."

Dean Thomas Arkle Clark of Illinois, who installed the Penn State chapter of Phi Eta Sigma, freshman scholastic honorary, in October, states that it is discouraging that college men, supposedly of high intelligence, should cling to tradition that they continue to observe "Hell Week." He points out that revolt, insubordination and arrogance will follow the next year if freshmen are hazed during initiation ceremonies.

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Albert Spaulding Says Jazz Makes Recitals Inferior

Believing that the use of popular music in concerts has resulted in the deterioration of modern recitals, Albert Spaulding, world famous violinist, will exclude jazz from his Artists' Course appearance in Schwab auditorium Thursday night.

Mr. Spaulding asserts that jazz is a means, not an end, and that it cannot develop into more than a useful technical expression. Through many contacts, he has found that people the world over long for good music.

While still a comparatively young man, Spaulding made an enviable reputation for himself as a composer. He has to his credit more than sixty violin compositions, twenty-five piano numbers, four orchestral compositions, and many transcriptions and arrangements.

Single tickets for his recital may be secured at the Treasurer's office beginning Monday morning.


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
