MISSOURI COLLEGIANS DECLARE SEX QUESTIONNAIRE 'HARMLESS'

"Harmless," was the answer of University of Missouri students when asked whether they thought the distribution of questionnaires on sex to both men and women students was proper, a dispatch in the Michigan Daily reveals.

The matter was treated by the majority of the students as a joke, the reporter states. The trouble arose when an enterprising reporter conceived the idea of writing a huge story on the subject for his newspaper.

As a result two faculty members of the sociology department, responsible for the questionnaire, were disciplined by Stratton D. Brooks, president of the University. In return President Frooks was censured last Thursday by a committee of the Association of University Professors.

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NEW JERSEY COLLEGE GIRLS FAVOR DUTCH TREAT SYSTEM

That all college dates should be "Dutch treat" is upheld by co-eds at the New Jersey college for women after a recent inter-class debate.

The Dutch treat system is supposed to make it possible for a girl to ask a man for a date without embarrassment because of the "fifty-fifty" basis of the proposition. The opposition claimed that this would be contrary to present convention and precedent.

One argument discussed by the co-eds: was that both college boys and girls are supported by their parents in most cases and merely because a parent is father of a son instead of a daughter is no reason why he should be more heavily taxed.

Clearing the attitude of the University of Missouri students, Hough stated: "No impropriety was manifest to the men and women students who received copies of the sex questionnaire. Certainly they were not shocked. It was considered by some as a joke; by many as an interesting experiment in sociological research, which was intended as its purpose."

Several hundred of the questionnaires, drawn up and approved by the dismissed professors, were distributed to men and women students with instructions to answer them anonymously.

The questionnaire, according to the investigating committee, alluded to "the changing economic status of women, the sexual code, and the morals ideas concerning the family."
