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## COLLEGE WILL RUN WOMEN DORMS AT SUMMER SESSION

**Plans Elimination of Privately Operated Fraternities as Rooming Homes**  
**AUTHORITIES TO RENT HOUSES IF NECESSARY**  
**'Standardization of System Is Movement's Purpose,' Officials State**

Plans whereby the College will operate all women's dormitory facilities for the 1930 Summer Session and eliminate private operations of fraternities as rooming and boarding houses, were announced yesterday by the College administration through Dean Will Grant Chambers, director of the Summer Session.

The movement is to aid the college and Summer Session to "standardize" dormitory service, furnish more uniform living accommodations, and fix definitely the responsibility for the quality of these services at the Summer Session, officials report.

Dr. Frank D. Kern, head of the graduate school, has been elected chairman of the geological section of the Botanical Society of America at its recent meeting in Des Moines.

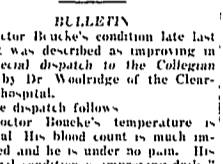
