## ORANGE LOSES TO LEHIGH, CORNELL

### Rochester and Western Reserve Downed by Hillmen—Bouts Begin at 2 O'clock

In an attempt to topple the Lion matmen for the first time this season, Bill Orange's undaunted wrestling team will take to the mats against the Varsity grapplers in Recreation Hall at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

A 36-to-0 victory over Western Reserve and a 22-to-8 defeat of Rochester Mechanical Institute are the highlights in the Hillmen's season. Last Saturday they demolished the Columbia matmen at 14-all.

Although the Orange team lost to both Lehigh and Cornell, the results belie the real strength of the Hillmen. In both those meets the New Yorkers won four bouts, but falls secured by their opponents gave them 18-to-12 victories over the Hillmen.

Syracuse Hits Veterans Coach Davison's team is strengthened by five veterans from last year, as well as three promising newcomers: Captain Jimmy Jamieson, Charlie Flagg, Joe Novak, Crowe, and Peavey are the veterans forming the backbone of the visiting aggregation.

One of the most interesting bouts of the meet probably will be between Paul Campbell and Crowe in the 155-pound setto. Both men have had good records so far this season. There is a possibility that the Syracuse captain may see action in this bout instead of in the 155-pound class.

Charlie Flagg will trade ticks with either Harlans or Marze in the opening match of the afternoon. Larry Cowell will come into the spotlight against Peavey, the Hillman 125-pounder, in the following encounter.

Captain Hubler will mix things with Barry, a newcomer to the Orange line-up, in the lightweight bout. Carpenter, the 115-pound Syracuse center, is scheduled to battle Karl Kaiser and Reybitz will probably be put in against Captain Jamieson.

Paul Long will follow Campbell and face Bill Freeman, the Hill strongman, in the light-heavyweight class. Ed Pearce in the unlimited setto is to meet either Joe Novak or Smith, the Orange candidates.

## 15 MEN ENTER N. Y. EVENTS TOMORROW

### Paul Rekers, in Best Form of Career, Favored for 2-Mile Title

With Paul Rekers favored to annex the 2-mile title, fifteen Penn State trackmen will vie with the representatives of twenty-eight Eastern colleges in the annual indoor IC-4A championships at New York City tomorrow night.

After a disappointing performance in the cross-country title test, Rekers has attained the best form of his career. Twice he ran the 2-mile in more than three seconds under the accepted collegiate indoor standard, defeating in one of these races Stanley Petkiewicz, Polish conqueror of Paavo Nurmi.

Rekers looks for his principal opposition from Joe Hagan of Columbia, defending titleholder, and Ritchie of Penn. Dick Dewfelder and Chuck Meisinger also are scheduled to carry the blue and white in this run. Coach Nate Catmell plans to shift one of these to the mile test, however.

Five Lions will face the starter in the 70-yard dash; Stookey, Stark, Fullerton, Marzucco, and Darlington comprising the sprint delegation. Two timber-toppers, McDowell and Funk, have been named for the 70-yard high hurdles. Red Morrill and Cal Shawley will heave the 35-pound weight, while Hammond, a newcomer, will compete in the high jump.

Coach Catmell has entered Martz, Kennedy, Darlington, Fullerton, Hildinger, and Flenskin in the mile relay. Since this brings the list up to seventeen men, two men will be cut from the entry. A leg injury to Flenskin probably will keep him behind, while a choice will be made between Martz and Kennedy before the team leaves tonight.

The strong, well-balanced squad of Pennsylvania is picked to carry the crown back to Philadelphia.

## Hamas Wins First Professional Fight

### Steve Hamas '29, Penn State's most versatile athlete, made his debut as a professional heavyweight by knocking out Al Baban, of New York, in the first round of a scheduled six-round bout at Passaic, N. J., Friday night.

Entering the ring wearing the familiar blue and white robe with Penn State lettered across the front, the former Nittany idol made short work of his opponent, flashing his K. O. punch after 2 minutes and 38 seconds of the first round had elapsed.

As a champion of the Lion ring, Steve battled his way to two intercollegiate boxing titles, receiving the crown in 1927 and again last season. During his collegiate career he received eleven letters, a Penn State record, and last year was voted the outstanding athlete of the year.

4 FRATERNITY RING TEAMS ENTER TOURNEY SEMI-FINALS

Winning their preliminary bouts early this week, Delta Upsilon, Phi Kappa Sigma, Pi Kappa Alpha, and Theta Kappa Phi gained the right to compete in the semi-finals of the Interfraternity boxing tournament Tuesday.

A steady reserve team may see service tonight or tomorrow. Bub Davis and Dave Miller may start the Colgate game. Mont Macomb is reserve center with Paul Moss and Joe Weber filling the defense posts.

Of the two opponents, Colgate presented the less difficult test. Outscored until the last few minutes of play the Maroon quintet came back to nose out the Nittany five, 25-to-21, in the Recreation Hall battle.

The 40-to-26 victory of Syracuse here last week-end and its claim to the eastern title provide a formidable obstacle to the Lions.
