varsity, Johnny Johnson succeeded in supplanting Kaiser in the 115-pound rank. The fighting senior also received the choice as Coach Spedler felt that his aggressive style would be more effective against opponents like Sargeant and Lipschitz of Cornell.

Campbell, runner-up in the 158-pound class last year, is back in his regular division and will compete for the middleweight crown in the title match. Ted Reibitz, who has been filling this gap all season, is out of the line-up because of an injured knee.

Both Paul Long and Ed Pearce also have been moved down a weight with the former entered in the 165-pound class and the latter in the light-heavy division. Pearce, a promising championship hope, has been undefeated in dual meets this season.

Johnny Zorella is Heavyweight. Johnny Zorella will make his debut in the heavyweight preliminaries. Although working with the team most of the season, this is the football star's first chance in collegiate competition. He is replacing Sam Fisher who is out for the season with a chest injury.

Sport scribes throughout the East, in predicting the possible individual winners, have placed Phillips of Lehigh, runner-up last year, and Colmore of Princeton as the best bets in the 115-pound division.

Habler, last year's runner-up in the 135-pound class, will find his hardest opposition in Truesdell, Cornell's runner-up in this rank last year. Whitridge, the Eli 135-pounder, and Butterworth, the Cayugaan aspirant, will put up a fight for the lightweight title.

Sargeant, the defending champion, is expected to be closely pressed by Lipschitz of Cornell. Campbell is the reigning favorite among the 155-pounders.

Cornell is counting on Johnson, the Ithaca leader, to win, although he Princeton, Yale, Baker, Columbia, and Pearce are well-matched for honors in the light-heavy class, while Batfield of Princeton is thought to have an edge over Rotan of Yale and Exels of Lehigh for the unlimited title.

Dean Edward Ellery, of Union college, will speak on "Radioactivity and the New Chemistry" in a public address in the Auditorium at the conclusion of the program. An informal reception will precede the banquet which will complete the installation.

Professors of law and sociology, and the president of the Liberal Club at the University, termed the outbreak 'boorish pugnaency' on the part of athletes.
