

ORATORS TO MEET 3 FORENSIC TRIOS ON EASTERN TRIP

Engage Lafayette Debaters in Oregon Plan Discussion Thursday Night

HOOD, KELLER, HITCHCOCK COMPRISE NITTANY TEAM

Will Face New York University As Final Contest—Audience To Decide Winner

Opening a five-day Eastern tour, Penn State's forensic team will engage Lafayette debaters in an Oregon plan debate at Easton Thursday night.

The Blue and White orators will discuss the negative of the subject "Resolved. That it is an unsound policy to give a Liberal Arts college education to all high school graduates who wish it." Kenneth Hood '30, Lawrence N. Keller '31, and Orville A. Hitchcock '32 comprise the team chosen for the trip. Coach Joseph F. O'Brien will accompany the team.

The orators will uphold complete disarmament for the United States, except for police protection, against Rutgers, Friday night in the second debate of the trip.

At the final contest of the tour the debaters will face New York university orators on the same subject Monday. The audience will give decisions in all the meets. The Oregon plan will not be used for the debates with Rutgers and New York university.

The debaters making the Eastern trip have taken part in an aggregate of twenty-three debates this season, Hood and Keller having made the Southern and Western trip in February. Hood has participated in eleven contests, while Keller and Hitchcock have debated nine and three times respectively.
