

Swimming Pool Project Is Revived by Bezdek

Class Presidents Plan Organizations to Stir Interest

Resulting a project dormant at Penn State for twenty-five years, Hugo Bezdek, director of athletics, took active steps Wednesday night to lead the visionary swimming pool out of obscurity into the realm of a possibility in the near future.

Following a meeting of class executive, with the athletic director early in the week, each president planned to appoint a committee to revive interest in the pool among the student body. On Wednesday night, Mr. Bezdek explained the pool project to a receptive junior class.

Evan C. Reese, president, named Andrew McNeillie chairman of the junior class swimming pool committee. Other members of the group which will plan methods of raising money and spreading propaganda for the pool are Frank Dietrich, David C. McLaughlin, William K. Ulrich, Karl F. Venter jr., and Charles A. Schmidt.

Although results of the committee's work will probably decide the method to be used in making the pool a reality, at the junior meeting it was suggested that each member of the class pledge \$10 to the project. If this idea is carried out throughout the student body, about \$10,000 would be realized, it was pointed out.

Such a sum would act as an impetus to the move and would aid greatly in influencing a material contribution from other sources, was the opinion at the meeting Wednesday night. The contribution would also finance the erection of the finest class memorial possible, it was shown.

Sidney H. Lewis '30, will head the senior group on the swimming pool investigation. He will name his assistants: Wilbur H. Zime-man, sophomore class president, and John A. Wood, freshman executive will select committee chairman to organize the interclass bodies.

Fifteen years after the first want for a swimming pool was felt here, 450 members of the class of 1922 pledged \$100 each for the installation of a pool. Because space was not available in the present Recreation Hall for the pool, the problem now includes a building to house the plant. However, \$22,000 has been collected from the 1922 pledges, and remaining hand, available for use in its original purpose at any time.

STANFORD GRADUATE MAKES PAPER FROM FORLST WASTE

In line with the national policy of conservation of natural resources, a Stanford university graduate student has perfected a method for making paper and wall-board from forest waste materials.

Samples of the wall-board made by this method are reputed to be of better quality than that made from the usual source of material for paper-making. Because of the great waste in the logging and milling work the source is unlimited although the commercial feasibility of the process has not yet been determined.

Co-eds Obtain Double Function for I. F. Ball

Freshman, sophomore, and upperclass women may have double social functions for the Interfraternity Ball week-end, the W. S. G. A. Senate decreed this week.

ALUMNI RECOGNIZE MONT ALTO SCHOOL

Penn State Graduate Council Officially Admits More Than 300 Members

More than 300 graduates of Mont Alto Forestry school are now definitely a part of Penn State. The executive board of the Alumni Association officially admitted the new group of alumni into the organization recently.

The new members will take active part in the selection of the first Alumni Council, and are included in the new districting plan which will divide the country into forty-five sections.

The foresters graduated from four year courses are found in all branches of forestry and allied fields. About 60 per cent of the graduates are now in forestry work in all parts of the country.

The Mont Alto Forest School was established in 1902 by the late Dr. J. T. Rothrock, generally recognized as the 'father of Pennsylvania forestry.' The forest school at Penn State was established as a department in the School of Agriculture.

As a result of the recent merger of the two schools the Pennsylvania State Forest School was originated, uniting the equipment and facilities of both units. Both plants are now used in training the foresters, and the coalition of the alumni bodies is the last step in the complete union of the two schools.

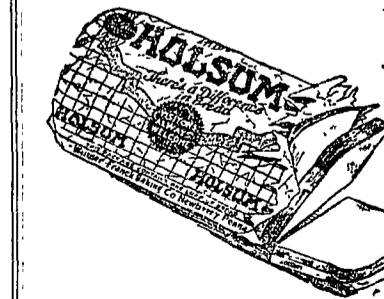
