

TIBBETT TO CLOSE ARTISTS' COURSE

Leading Actor in 'Rogue Song' Will Give Recital Monday Night in Auditorium

Lawrence Tibbett, leading baritone of the Metropolitan Opera company, will offer the concluding number of Penn State's first Artists' Course in Schwab auditorium at 8:15 o'clock Monday night.

Mr. Tibbett is considered by critics as one of the greatest living baritone-tenors and has the added distinction of being described as Metropolitan's best actor. He has devoted himself mainly to operettas, in addition to appearances on the concert stage.

The baritone is appearing in the talking picture "Rogue Song," now playing at New York and Philadelphia theatres. He is the first great opera star to make a talking motion picture, according to the Public Ledger.

Played Shakespearean Roles The Metropolitan artist took the leading roles in two recent presentations at the Metropolitan Opera house. One was in the American opera, "The King's Henchman," and the other in "Johnny Spelt Auf," a German jazz opera.

For some years the well-known baritone did not know whether to make drama or music his life work because he was appearing frequently in Shakespearean plays with local stock companies. After playing in many operettas and light operas, however, he was given a contract with the Metropolitan Opera company and has continued with them.
