

Higgins Named Grid Coach; Joe Bedenk To Direct Baseball

"The Athletic Board of Control has canvassed the field thoroughly and we believe that Mr. Higgins is best qualified to carry out the responsibilities of head coach under the requirements peculiar to Penn State. We are sure that this step will make for the development of athletes at this college as we wish them to be, the President concluded.

HIGGINS PLAYED ON VARSITY TEAM IN 1911 AS FRESHMAN

Starting his collegiate football career with a rush, Bob Higgins, newly appointed head grid coach, as a freshman battled his way to an end position on the 1914 Lion football team.

This was the last year that freshmen were permitted to participate in varsity athletic contests. During his undergraduate days the Lion star was selected to a first team position on Walter Camp's All-American and twice to his second team.

In 1919 Higgins completed his most successful season. He was captain of the Lion team under the tutelage of Hugo Bezdek. It was in this year that Camp gave him All-American rating and this was also the last time a Penn State grid team has succeeded in overcoming the Pitt Panthers. Higgins submerged the Pittsburghers under a 20-0-0 deluge.

Following the 1915 and 1916 seasons, Camp recognized him as an outstanding player by placing him on his second team. In 1917 Bob was elected captain but with the entrance of the United States into the World War, he accepted a captain's commission in the army and did not return to college. At the end of the War he returned to his Alma Mater.

After graduating he again entered the Service but shortly thereafter resigned to accept a position as head coach of the West Virginia Wesleyan football team. He remained there until 1924 when he went to Washington university, as head football coach. In 1928 he accepted an appointment as assistant coach to Bezdek, his former mentor.

BEDENK COACHED FLORIDA, RICE TEAMS FOR 7 YEARS

Assuming direction of his Alma Mater's diamond team as successor to his former coach Hugo Bezdek, next spring, Joe Bedenk returns to Penn State after five years as baseball coach at Rice Institute, Texas, and University of Florida. Bedenk entered Penn State in 1919.

N.C.A.A. Shifts Date Of District Conclave

Because conflicting engagements prevented delegates from attending the second district conference of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, originally planned for tomorrow, the conclave has been postponed to a date later in the spring.

Many representatives who responded to the invitation approved the plan and regretted their inability to attend. Dean R. L. Sackett, head of the Engineering school, and vice-president of the association reported last night. Dr. Charles W. Kennedy of Princeton university, the national president, has telegraphed his readiness to attend a meeting later in the year.

After playing both freshman football and baseball, he won a varsity berth on both teams for the remainder of his college days. Recognition by Walter Camp as an All-American guard, and election to the captaincy of the Nittany eleven came in his senior year. Bedenk played right field and was a dangerous hitter on the diamond. The new mentor was graduated in 1924, having dropped out of college for a semester. In 1921, 1925, and 1926 he was varsity baseball and football line coach at Rice Institute. He occupied the same positions at the University of Florida in 1927 and 1928. Bedenk came back to Penn State last fall to serve under Bezdek as a line coach.

Nominate 20 for John W. White Awards—Senate Committee To Decide Winners

Miss Janette M. Burns, Archibald W. Johnston, Miss Janice L. Kauffman, William K. Saylor and James T. Wolfe were nominated for the John W. White Medal at a meeting of the senior class Wednesday night.

Fifteen seniors were named candidates for three John W. White fellowships at the same meeting. The names of the nominees will be submitted to the Senate committee on academic standards to determine the winners of the awards.

Norman L. Arnold, Bruce Baldwin, John L. Bahart, Edward W. Borden, Edward C. Bromley, James H. Coogan Jr., Albert H. Heimbach, Raymond R. Hoffman, Archibald W. Johnston, Miss Janice L. Kauffman, Daniel E. LeVan, Fred C. Schweerer, Henry Thalenfeld, Robert A. Winter, and James T. Wolfe were the candidates named for the graduate fellowships.

John W. White fellowships are awarded for scholastic merit, and consist of \$600 which must be employed in graduate study at Penn State or some other college. Both prizes will be awarded on Scholarship Day.

In addition to the class nominees, one candidate will be suggested by the dean of each school. The faculty committee which will select the final winner is headed by Dr. Carl W. Hassel, of the department of economics and sociology.

Dr. Carl E. Marquardt, College examiner, Prof. Bruce V. Moore, of the education and psychology department, Prof. Paul E. Breneman, head of the mechanics department, and Dr. David P. McFarland of the metallurgy department, are other members of the committee.

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March Blizzard Surprises College As Spring Arrives With Winter Snows

Spring arrived with winter's snow. Inhabitants of State College awoke Wednesday morning to find the town in the grip of a whipping March blizzard.

Arriving 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, the chilling winds and flurries of snow increased in violence and volume until the rear guard of King Winter's hosts had successfully laid siege to State College.

The freezing mark was reached early in the day and the cold spell continued through the night. Freshmen were hard put to keep fraternity bonfire fires burning, and lawns that had been rolled in preparation for spring clean-up were frozen hard under the white blanket of the equinoctial blizzard.

According to papers from nearby towns, the storm originated in the Middle West and worked its way with lightning-like rapidity toward the Atlantic seaboard. Its arrival in the vicinity of State College was entirely unexpected and struck before warnings could be issued, the Ag hill weather bureau revealed.
