Professional Musical Organization Will Sponsor Sixth Sunday Afternoon Concert

Kappa Gamma Psi, national professional musical fraternity, will sponsor a varied musical program as the sixth presentation of the mid-winter concert series in Schwab auditorium at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Opening the concert, the College orchestra, under the direction of Wilfred O. Thompson, bandmaster, will play two numbers. Walter J. Culp '31 will offer two trumpet solos as the next selections.

Two more numbers by the orchestra, and baton solos by Clifford Burnett '31 will follow on the program. Ernest P. Black '31 will conclude the concert with several violin selections.

Lawrence Tibbett, leading baritone of the Metropolitan Opera company, who sang here Monday night in the concluding program of the first Artists' Course series, was made an honorary member of the fraternity Tuesday night.

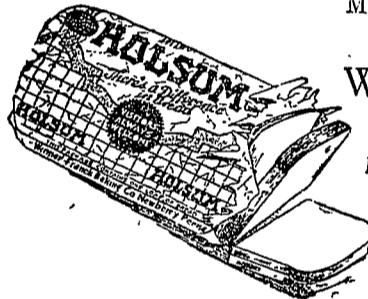
