

Council Committee Head Clarifies Election Code

Lewis Believes System Tends To Eliminate Unfair Tactics

As a guide for student political machines starting their final campaign drives this week, Lewis H. Lewis '30, chairman of Student Council Elections committee, last night issued a statement clarifying the 1930 Election code.

Elaborating upon section one of the code, Lewis declared that no additions to the party tickets or withdrawals from them would be permitted by the committee and that the "complete lists submitted" by the cliques Sunday night would be published on the ballots.

"Handbills, campaign cards, sample ballots, or any other forms of political advertising come under the category of campaign material," Lewis stated, "and, under the provision of section two of the code, may not be distributed before midnight Sunday. All campaign material must be submitted to the committee before it is published."

He believes that by punching a A identification cards, in addition to checking the name of each voter in the student directory, the practice of "winging illegally for men dropped from College after the directory has been published will be eliminated. He has ordered 2600 ballots, which corresponds to the number of students eligible to vote, and will distribute these in small lots at each polling place as a further precaution against possible ballot box "stuffing." No objectionable methods of vote-soliciting will be permitted at the polls.

Limits Smoker Length

Commenting upon sections six and seven of the code, Lewis said: "Although two senior members of Student Council will be stationed at each of the six ballot boxes, they will not be representatives of the schools, in which they are enrolled. This should eliminate any criticism of the polls."

Elections will begin at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and close at 12 o'clock Thursday noon. Polls will close at 1:30 o'clock Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons and open at 8 o'clock Wednesday and Thursday mornings.

He stated that cliques will be allowed but one speaker on either Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday night. In order that scholarship shall not be menutably affected by the campaign, the hour will be limited from 7 until 10 o'clock.

"Because Student Council felt that there was little general interest in the political mass meeting held last year it has been done away with in the present system," Lewis explained.

In a final warning against possible violations of the code, chairman Lewis said:

"If there are any violations, the entire party ticket may be thrown out and a new election held. As further punishment it is possible that none of the candidates of the guilty clique will be allowed to run."

ELECTIONS CODE

1. Cliques shall make public their members by midnight of Sunday, April 27, 1930. These lists shall be handed into the chairman of the elections committee and will be printed in the COLLEGIAN.
2. No campaign material shall be distributed prior to 12:01 A. M. on Monday of Elections Week.
3. A. A. cards will be used in balloting. These cards shall be punched when the voter registers and receives his ballot.
4. All campaign material must be submitted to the elections committee for approval before it is published.
5. All procedure by any clique must first be approved by the elections committee.
6. Senior members of Student Council shall be in charge of the ballot boxes. Two seniors shall be at each box.
7. The time of balloting shall be from 8 until 11:30 o'clock A. M. and 1 until 4:30 P. M. from Tuesday noon until Thursday noon of Elections Week.
8. Elections Week shall be the week of May 5, 1930.
9. Nominations must be handed in to the chairman of the elections committee no later than midnight of Sunday, April 27, 1930.
10. Clique smokers may be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Elections Week. Because of scholarship reasons, smokers will be from 7 until 10 o'clock only.
11. Campaign expenses shall be limited to \$50.00. A list of all expenses must be submitted to the committee by Wednesday midnight of Elections Week.
12. There shall be no mass meeting.
13. Ballots shall be counted at the end of the balloting. There shall be an open count Thursday afternoon of Elections Week.
14. Any violation of the elections code shall be punishable by the dropping of the guilty party's candidate or candidates from the ballot after due considerations.

Ion, Beta Kappa, Alpha Phi Delta, Tau Phi Delta, Phi Sigma Delta, Alpha Tau Omega, Friends Union, Phi Pi Phi, Pi Kappa Alpha, Beta Sigma Rho, Sigma Nu, Chi Phi, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Phi Kappa Sigma, Phi Lambda Theta, Phi Delta Theta, and Tau Sigma Phi.

Comparing the power of the two parties, there are 273 for the Independents and 271 for the Locust Lane adherents, leaving 166 votes unaccounted for. These remaining ballots and the inroads of the Thomson partisans on the cliques will determine the final result, political circles maintain.

Close 1932 Campaign

The 1932 drive finds George T. Lasich and Alfred E. Lewis heading two closely-matched machines. Lasich's followers, the Locust Lane group, included twenty-seven fraternities on their list, while Lewis' faction Campus clique, claimed twenty-eight. The Locust Lane vote based on the Registrar's figures, is 283; while Lewis' is 280. The remainder of qualified electors in the class being 866.

W. Aubrey Meyers, Locust Lane chairman, declared Lasich will amass 350 votes, while Jack A. Staley, Campus chairman, felt sure of 350 ballots for Lewis. The non-fraternity ballots will prove the decisive factor, campus politicians predict.

Among Lasich's adherents are Al-

1300 May Receive Hospital Care Under Proposed Plan

Sufficient Funds Available, Report Reveals, If Student Vote Favors System

Sufficient funds to care for more than 1300 students free of charge will be available each year if a favorable vote is given the Free Hospital proposal at student elections next week.

The estimate, made in connection with a statement of approximate expenditures under the proposed system, was released by the College Health Service yesterday. It is based on an average confinement period of four and one-half days, requiring \$12,500 if the proposed increase from \$1 to \$10 is accepted by students, approximately \$39,000 will be received by the Health Service from student fees each year. Total receipts for the fiscal year ending in April were \$19,313.98, of which \$14,820 were received from health fees paid at registration.

With the addition of a second full-time physician, the payroll of the staff would be increased to \$16,260, while the employment of two more nurses would add \$7,000 to the salary item. One thousand two hundred and thirty-five dollars would be required for board, lodging, and laundry for the nurses, bringing the total additional cost for the staff to \$7,870.

The cost of drugs, now covered by individual student assessment, would be approximately \$1000 while officials expect to spend at least \$1000 each year for new equipment.

The remainder of the receipts, amounting to nearly \$13,000, would be available for care of students confined to the hospital and would cover the remaining expenses. This sum would permit a confinement period of from seven to ten days without charge. The present charge is \$2.50 for each day in the hospital.
