

Batsmen Engage Susquehanna Today; Stickmen To Oppose Western Maryland

DOWN F. AND M. IN THIRD HOME GAME

Conquer Lancaster Nine 5-3 as DeBonis Shines—Will Play Colgate Saturday

After scoring a clear cut 5-to-3 victory over the unexpecting young Franklin and Marshall team, an improved Lion baseball nine will encounter Susquehanna at 4 o'clock this afternoon on New Beaver field, and will oppose Colgate at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Coach Bezdek will probably send Hal Stokes and Rod Fry to the mound for the two engagements. If either of these twirlers maintain the same standard of pitching exhibited by Al DeBonis in his last few starts, the Nittany team should register its fourth and fifth victories on the home field this season.

Season's records indicate that the Lions should vanquish Susquehanna today, but the result of tomorrow's conflict with the Colgate Maroon is more in doubt. Lately, however, the Hamilton team has not been able to break into the win column. Last week Colgate lost to New York University, 7-to-1, and to Columbia, 10-to-5. Coach Bill Reid will start either Purple or Davis against Penn State.

Franklin and Marshall brought a clever, hard fighting team from Lancaster to engage the Nittany batsmen. The visitors threw a scare into the Lion camp when they acquired a two-run lead in the third inning and were able to maintain it until the sixth. Al DeBonis pitched nearly airtight ball throughout the entire game, holding his opponents to five scattered hits.

Bezdek's pupils could not fathom Smokey's delivery until the sixth when Musser walked and scored on DeBonis' triple. The Lion pitcher lashed an French's single, and Lurvey forced out Coop at second. Then Lurvey counted the third run on Dietrich's hit and Darlington's error.

Racqueters Will Play 5 Singles, 2 Doubles on Varsity Courts Tomorrow Afternoon

Penn State's 1930 netmen will wield their racquets against Franklin and Marshall on the Varsity courts tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock in their opening engagement for the third consecutive year with the Lancaster team.

Five single and two double matches will be played, Paul Barber and Captain Ted Wolfe composing the one doubles team, while Johnny Metzner and ex-captain Ed Butler will be paired off to make up the other duo.

In the singles matches Paul Barber will be number one man with Captain Wolfe in the second position. Butler and Johnny Metzner have been picked to fill the third and fourth posts.

Because of inclement weather conditions, daily practice has been somewhat retarded and the number five man has not as yet been selected. Coach Dick Stover stated that this position would be filled by either Glenn Thomson, Robinson, Ted Bowman, or Hartler although Robinson would be the likely candidate.

Although the team won the match by a 3-to-2 score last year, most of the sets were quite close and Stover decided that this year would probably be a repetition.

WILL MEET TERROR TWELVE IN OPENER

Ken Kaiser To Lead Team From Out Home Post—Lions Won Last Season, 5-3

Penn State's untired lacrosse twelve will face an experienced Western Maryland varsity on New Beaver field at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Under the guidance of Captain Ken Kaiser, at the out home berth, the Lion team will strive to uphold last year's record when, in the first game scheduled with the Green Terrors, Penn State walked off with a 6-to-1 victory.

Johnny Edmonds, at in home, Whitely Antonson, Otto Kath, and Carl Anderson in the attack positions will fill the offensive roles in tomorrow's contest. Joe Weber, steady Lion center, will continue in the position which he held last year.

Meeting the strong attack trio of the visitors, Alon McMillan and Tom Reilly at home, will meet every scoring attempt. Prizer, Edwards, and Stanley will bolster this fast-working duo. Kai Kaiser, efficient stick-wielder, will defend the Nittany goal.

Captain Gonsak, leader of the Terrors offense, together with Wellinger and Ussinger in the home berths show promise of pushing the ball towards the crease. Working from the center position Bates has been successful in showing a wealth of ability which he will without doubt use in tomorrow's game.

Although unsuccessful the Western Maryland twelve showed a powerful, smooth-working organization in two previous contests. An Easter game was dropped 3-to-2 to Penn. They were also unsuccessful in an encounter with the Maryland Terrapins.
