

BATTERS VANQUISH MUHLENBURG, 6-0

Al DeBonis Holds Visitors To 4 Safeties—Hoopes, Young Make 3-Baggers

Al DeBonis held Muhlenburg to four scattered hits as the Lion batsmen fielded faultlessly and scored their first shutout victory of the season Saturday afternoon, 6-to-0.

Only thirty-one batters faced the Nittany twirler during his nine innings on the mound. Two advanced as far as third base and one other reached the keystone sack.

Penn State scored three of its runs in the first two innings, and three more in the seventh and eighth. In the opening session French scored on a fielder's choice, a stolen base, an error and Diederich's single. In the next inning the Lions tallied two more counts on Hoopes' triple and singles by DeBonis and Livezey.

Visitors Threaten in First Diederich was walked in the seventh and crossed the plate when Hobbs doubled. The Blue and White tallied their final markers in the next frame on Ed Young's three-bagger, Livezey's single and two miscues in the field by the visiting team.

Muhlenburg came nearest to scoring in the first inning. After Weber grounded out, Steinhauer singled and went to third on Snyder's one base blow. Smith and Giltner, the next batters, were then retired to end the visitor's opportunity.

Coach Bezdok's team will leave Thursday to encounter both Colgate and Syracuse on foreign diamonds Friday and Saturday. In order to remain in the running for the "triangular association" championship, the Lions must score victories in both games, as the Maroon already has one triumph over the Nittany team to its credit.

Take 18 Straight Sets To Win 9-0—Rain Cancels Colgate Contest Saturday

By winning eighteen straight sets, Lion racket wielders blanketed Syracuse 9-to-0 Friday and were named out at Colgate Saturday afternoon in their scheduled match with the Maroon racketeers on the last trip of the season.

In the first singles match, Paul Barber downed Behm of Syracuse 6-1, 6-1, while Captain Ted Wolfe defeated Gritz 6-1, 6-1 in the second engagement. Ditty lost to Ed Butler in the third position 6-3, 6-1, and Johnny Metzner, as fourth man, won over Burns 6-1, 6-2.

Continuing to keep his record unbroken, Robinson downed the Orange fifth man, Grant usso, 6-2, 6-1 as Glenn Thompson cleaned the singles slate by defeating Miller 6-2, 6-1.

Using the same doubles combination as in the Gettysburg match, Barber and Metzner paired off to conquer Behm and Gritz 6-1, 6-1. Wolfe and Butler made up the second duo and won from Ditty and Burns 6-4, 6-1. In the final match of the afternoon, Robinson and Thompson swamped Grant usso and Saunders 6-1 and 6-0.

Charles Hildebrand, former presi-

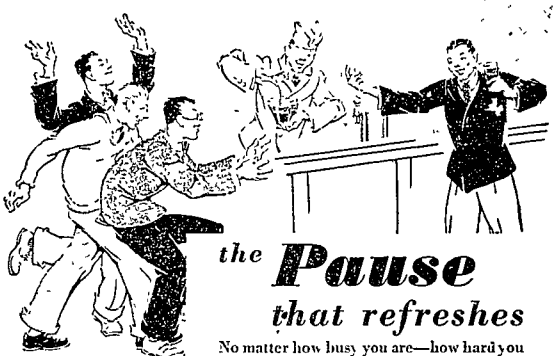
