Penn State alumni, faculty, guests, and undergraduates will sway to the strains of Phil Emerton's Diamonds, Million Dollar Pier entertainers, at the annual formal Commencement dance to be held in Recreation hall from 10:45 until 2 o'clock next Monday night.

Continuing the custom, there will be a receiving line lasting until 10:45 o'clock. It will be comprised of President Hetzel, Board of Trustees, Deans of Schools, and twenty ushers selected from the faculty of the various schools.

Professors and instructors will be in the booths of their schools during the reception to further greet the guests. The official insignia of each school will be placed outside of the respective booth. Music during the reception will be furnished by Kappa Gamma Psi, national professional musical fraternity.

Blue and white decorations will be carried throughout the color scheme. Columns and the balcony will be draped with the College colors. Streamers of the same colors will be strung to the large crystal ball to hang in the center of the hall. Electric lights will be suspended with streamers of similar and oak leaves.

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ALUMNI TO HOLD CLASS REUNIONS

'Old Grads' Congregate Here for Fifth Year Home-Coming Next Monday

With every indication pointing toward a record-breaking attendance, Penn State alumni will return to the College beginning Friday to participate in class reunions and Commencement Week festivities.

Opening the four-day celebration the alumni will attend the combined musical club's concert in Schwab auditorium at 7:45 o'clock Friday night. Election of three members to the Board of Trustees will take place Saturday morning, followed by the first meeting of the newly-formed Alumni Council.

The annual alumni golf tournament is scheduled to begin at 1 o'clock on the College course. At the same time the alumnae will hold a luncheon at the University club. A lacrosse game later in the afternoon between Penn State and the Onondaga Indians and a Theatopian musical comedy Saturday night complete the day's activities.

Thompson to Speak
Dr. William O. Thompson, president emeritus of Ohio State University, will deliver the Baccalaureate sermon in Schwab auditorium next Sunday morning. The College symphony band will present a concert on front campus in the afternoon, followed by vesper services conducted by the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A.

Next Monday has been designated as Alumni Day. Classes that have been graduated at five year intervals will hold reunions. Three of the four living members of the class of 1880 will return to celebrate their fifty-third commencement anniversary, while the class of 1925, the youngest to hold an organized reunion, is expected to have the largest delegation.

After the senior class day exercises in the morning, the alumni will conduct their reunions. A campus luncheon is to be served and the classes will parade to New Beaver field to witness the baseball game between Penn State and Syracuse. An Alumni dinner in McAllister Hall, a Players' presentation in the auditorium, and a commencement reception and dance complete the program.

Future Plans of Graduating Class Show Seniors Seek Higher Learning

Many prominent members of the senior class will not end their collegiate careers after receiving diplomas next Tuesday, but will enter other institutions for advanced work, a survey of the graduating class reveals.

F. Bruce Baldwin, president of the class, has accepted a fellowship at the University of Minnesota, while J. Theodore Wolfe, class valedictorian, will enter the Harvard graduate school of business administration. Paul S. Williams, secretary of Student Council, will matriculate at the Columbia university law school.

Keepers To Study Law
Martin S. McAndrews, captain of the boxing team, and J. Neil Slahley, basketball captain, will both enter Dickinson law school. McAndrews has been employed by the state officials to train new officers at the Hershey training school.

Continuing her legal studies, Helen S. Keeper, member of the woman's debating team, will also enter Dickinson law school. Caroline S. Hailer, president of Archonai, plans to continue her studies in Europe this summer.

Russell F. Mollenauer, basketball manager, has accepted a position in dairy husbandry work with the Turma Milk company, of St. Louis. Boni J. Gason, member of the boxing team, will probably teach school and coach athletics, while E. Joseph Weber, lacrosse player, will work with the American Budge company, of Pittsburgh.

Working either as a sales engineer or as a member of the advertising staff, Russell L. Rehm, business manager of the COLLEGIAN, may enter the employ of Westinghouse Electrical company. Albert F. Bell, editor of Froth will teach at Chester high school and later enter the advertising field, while Russell A. Ziegler, business manager of Froth, will probably enter the employ of the Arrow Collar company.
