#### A STEP FORWARD

The opening of Penn State's twenty-first Summer Session marks the close of the first attempt here to operate the College on an all year's basis. Officials of the Inter-Session unanimously declare the effort highly successful, and have taken progressive steps to further the usefulness of the two-weeks course.

Attendance exceeded the 150 mark. A vast majority of the students were graduates, or were professionally trained and had no difficulty in grasping the essentials of a course as they were offered in a compressed session. Approximately 85 per cent of the Inter-Session attendants signified an intention of attending the regular Summer Session.

One of the encouraging points in the administration of the short session was the submission of a questionnaire to all students which requested their individual opinion as to the best course offered, the worst course offered, and suggestions on courses to be added and courses to be removed from the catalog.

### INTER-SESSION WINS EDUCATORS' PRAISE

#### Results Insure Course's Higher Development

Throwing its doors open to seekers of education for an added period of two weeks between the close of the regular term and the beginning of Summer Session, Penn State has successfully made a progressive educational step recognized and lauded by directors and heads of other Eastern institutions.

At the close of the Inter-Session, Dr. Will Grant Chambers revealed that the results of the experiment were highly satisfactory and that steps had been taken to continue the Session and improve the courses in the future.

About eighty-five per cent of the students enrolled in the Inter-Session will register for work in the regular Summer Session also. Three Inter-Session students completed requirements for degrees and will receive their diplomas August 8.

Planning the short course principally for graduates and professionally trained students, nine courses in education were offered, all of which were given to aid in the fulfillment of requirements for teachers. State permits. In addition forty-nine elective courses were offered, and would be given if a group of twelve selected the same subject. One hundred and fifty-six attended the Inter-Session.

### GRADUATE IN FINAL TEST FOR ROME SCHOLARSHIP

Henry G. Whiffen '30 Only 4-Year Student To Win Recognition

The first Penn State graduate to compete for the Rome Fellowship in landscape architecture, Henry G.

Whiffen '30, is at present preparing his design for the final competition. Whiffen is the only four-year student to place in the finals.

Of the six finalists selected from more than forty contestants, three are graduate students from Harvard and the other two completed five-year courses at Cornell. The Fellowship provides for \$250 annually for three years, to be used for study in Europe. Penn State graduates were invited

to compete for the Rome Fellowship this year since the college was selected as one of the eight charter members in the formation of the Federation of Professional Schools of Landscape Architecture last winter. At the first competition held by the federation, Penn State placed second. Harvard was the leading university.
