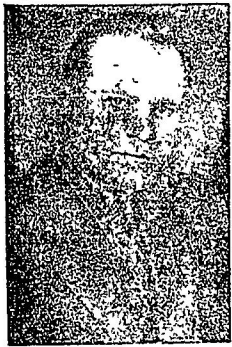


DR. DELONG WRITES INSTITUTE VOLUME

In evaluating the present program of in-service education required of Pennsylvania teachers through the annual institute attendance...

Since the state law requires all districts to maintain institutes, Dr. DeLong accepts the thesis that the institutes should be used to promote a common state-wide program of education.

Of this number 132 appeared as speakers for the program of only one year. Only seven instructors in institute education were listed on the programs of five consecutive years.

These words that have become deeds," he writes.

Elaborating, he says, "All poetry is a reproduction of the tones of actual speech. There are two types of realists—the one who offers a good deal of dirt with his potato to show that it is a real one, and the one who is satisfied with the potato brushed clean. I'm inclined to be the second kind."

"Who Owns the Poetry?" Pursuing his discussion, he maintains, "A poem begins with a lump in the throat, a home-sickness or a love-sickness. It is a reaching-out toward expression; an effort to find fulfillment. A complete poem is one where an emotion has found its thought and the thought has found the words."

For his series of lectures in the English Institute, Mr. Frost will discuss, "Who Owns the Poetry?" He has lectured on poetry at Amherst College and is now a Fellow of Letters at the University of Michigan.

He will supplement his theme by a discussion of "Jingle and the Balanced Sentence, or First Steps in Education in Form."

Since he has become well known, Frost has written "Mountain Interval," "New Hampshire," the Pulitzer prize book for 1924, and "West-Running Brook."

degrees will be conferred Thursday night. Of this number 81 will be granted by the School of Education.

Fifty-one of the graduating teachers

will receive B. A.'s, twenty-seven will be granted B. S.'s, while three expect to be graduated in the curriculum of Industrial Education.

In the School of Liberal Arts, there are nineteen candidates for the B. A. degree. Fourteen engineering students have completed the prescribed course of study for their B. S., and one Mineral Industries student will graduate.

Completing the list of schools, three candidates from the School of Agriculture, and two from the School of Chemistry and Physics will be recommended for degrees.

Sixty-one graduate students have completed advanced courses of study and will obtain recognition at the seventh commencement. Eighteen of this number will be given M. A.'s, thirty-nine will receive M. S.'s, while four will be recommended for the degree of Master of Education.
