

### TRUSTEES TO ACT ON KIESS VACANCY

Board Will Select Successor at January Meeting—Elects 2 New Members

Penn State lost a trustee of 17 years' service when Congressman Edgar R. Kiess, representative of the sixteenth district of Pennsylvania, died during July. A successor will be appointed to fill the vacancy at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees in January.

Appointed to the Board of Trustees of the College in 1913 by Governor John K. Tener, Representative Kiess served continuously since that time, and was reappointed in July of this year by Governor John S. Fisher. Mr. Kiess was one of the active members of the Board and readily gave of his time and influence to be of service to the College.

Representative Kiess died at his summer home in Eagles Mere, succumbing to a heart attack. At that time he was preparing his campaign for a tenth term in Congress, having represented his district in Washington for eighteen years. He had entered public life with his election to the State Assembly in 1904.

#### Trustees Elect Two

As representatives of County industrial and agricultural societies, John G. Benedict, a banker of Waynesboro, and Ernest J. Poole, a manufacturing executive of Reading, were elected to the College Board of Trustees during Commencement week.

Delegates of the societies re-elected Chester J. Tyson of Gardners and Frank P. Willets of Concoardville. William A. Affelder of Pittsburgh, Boyd A. Musser of Scanton, and James G. White of New York City were again selected as alumni trustees. Colonel J. Franklin Shields, and James L. Hamill, were honored by the graduates for twenty-five years service on the Board.

### 'Y' Hut Nears Close Of 13 Years' Service

After thirteen years of service, the "Y" hut, green and white relic of the World War on the Penn State campus, will give way to the corps of workmen engaged in the beautifying program when it is razed this month. The Y M C A has moved into new quarters in Old Main.

Erected during the war, the familiar hut added the last touch needed at that time to create the impression of Penn State as a military training camp. The hut was kept in use during the construction period and served as a rendezvous for idle freshmen.

#### M. E. LABORATORY INSTALLS NEW MARINE DIESEL ENGINE

During the summer months, a new type Diesel engine for use in marine propulsion was installed in the College mechanical engineering laboratory. The engine is a four-cylinder motor, of fifty horse power capacity.

This new machine will be one of the types studied by the seven lieutenants from the United States Navy who began their course here last semester. The officers will complete their study here next June when they will receive the degree of Master of Science.

### STRUCK PUBLISHES EDUCATION TEXT

Summer Session Students Employ Book for Basic Courses in Industrial Teaching

"Foundations of Industrial Education," a text by Dr. F. Theodore Struck, head of the department of industrial education, has been published and was used for the first time at the past Summer Session.

Dr. Struck's volume, about 500

pages in length, was printed early this summer by John Wiley and Sons, of New York. This work is a companion to "Methods of Teaching Problems in Industrial Education," by the same author.

Intended to serve as a text for foundation and orientation courses in industrial education, the new book is a practical treatise on the underlying philosophy, basic principles, prevailing practices, accepted terminology, and recognized standards in trade and industrial education.

The volume contains a background of the social, economic, educational and historical factors influencing modern vocational education.

#### COLUMNS TOTAL 600 TONS

Ten limestone columns supporting the portico in front of Old Main weigh sixty tons each. Special foundations had to be built to support the weight, the reinforced concrete bases resting on solid rock to insure permanency.

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
