Kaplan Returns in Wing Berth As Remainder of Lineup Stays Unchanged

The lineup for the Penn State-Marshall football game will be found on the sports page.

Determined to keep the season's record unblemished, a formidable Nittany grid array will attempt to score its third triumph of the year against Marshall college at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon on New Beaver field.

Captain Yutz Diedrich, study Lion halfback, has not taken part in any of the scrimmages this week and the Penn State eleven will probably take the field tomorrow minus a leader.

Leading his Nittany team, Frank Diedrich '31, football captain, will speak briefly. The entire grid squad will attend the pre-game assembly.

Interspersed with Penn State songs and cheers, the speeches will be short. Mass singing and cheering, led by College cheerleaders, will add impetus to the meeting.

Coach John Maulbetsch will bring a seasoned aggregation from Huntington to oppose the Nittany Lions, although only three of the Big Green team faced the Penn State eleven last year.

Marshall opened its season two weeks ago by holding the powerful (Continued on fifth page.)

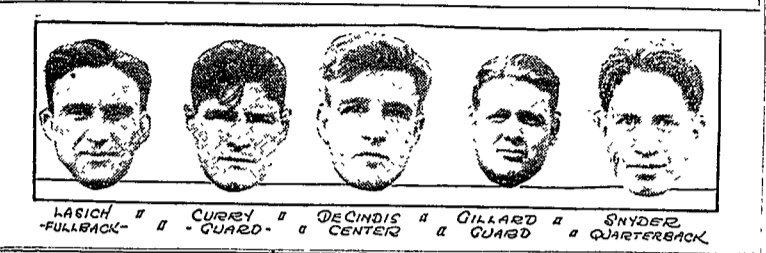
LEITZEL REVEALS LANDSCAPE PLANS

LABOR SECRETARY FLIES HERE TODAY

Davis Will Address Conservation Congress at 8 O'clock in Schwab Auditorium

Arriving by airplane late this afternoon from Washington, D. C., Secretary of Labor James J. Davis will land at the Bellefonte Air Port and will be brought immediately to State College in time to deliver the principal address of the Conservation Congress at 8 o'clock tonight in Schwab Auditorium.

In a telegram to President Ralph D. Hetzel, Secretary Davis stated that because of the great amount of work with which he is confronted at the present time in addition to a meeting of the President's Cabinet this morning, it will be necessary for him to travel by air as a time saving medium.

The administration office stated last night that President Hetzel's car would be sent to Bellefonte to meet the Secretary of Labor, but that all other plans pending upon the time of the guest's arrival.

W.P. Sound keynote As the chief speaker of the Conservation Congress, Davis will speak on "Conservation and Its Importance to Humanity." A musical program furnished by the Department of Music, will serve as a prelude to the address.

The Conservation Congress was called to give organizations and individuals an opportunity to discuss a proposed plan to assist in its development and to suggest the best means for putting this program of nature education into the public schools of Pennsylvania.

The Congress will begin at 2 o'clock this afternoon in Schwab Auditorium when Dr. James N. Rale, deputy superintendent of education for Pennsylvania, will give the opening address. Davis will speak at the second meeting tonight and the final session will be held at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning in room 405 Old Main.

Will Tour Campus In groups of twenty, parents will begin an inspection of Penn State's new buildings immediately after their meeting. Under the supervision of Col. E. J. Keller, secretary of the parents' association, the guests will survey the new unit, the new Engineering building, and the Liberal Arts annex. Many of the new campus will be presented for the guidance of the visitors.

Penn State's encounter with Marshall college on New Beaver field at 2:30 o'clock will attract many of the parents during the afternoon. The visitors will be required to pay admission to the game for the first time in many years, because of the decision of the Athletic Association to grant no free passes to the guests.

Women Arrange Tea Women students will welcome mothers who are attending the celebration at a tea and reception in the Women's building from 3 until 5:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

More than 1000 fathers, are expected to attend a Dad's Day smoker in the Armory at 7 o'clock tomorrow night. Presenting their commencement show of last year for the visitors, Penn State Players will stage "The Meenest Man in the World" at 8 o'clock tomorrow night, immediately upon conclusion of the smoker.
