

Soccer Team Wins Pre-Season Game

Varsity Booters Defeat Pick-up Eleven in Practice Tilt 6-to-2 Saturday

Showing a brilliant pre-season form, the tentative varsity soccer eleven defeated a pickup team of graduates, and second string material 6-to-2 Saturday afternoon.

Centered about Bud Anderson, experienced forward, the regular attack held the ball in the All-Star territory during the greater part of the game. With Shepherd and Masters in the right forward positions and Musser and Tyson in the left attack, Coach Bill Jeffrey found a combination which shows promise of giving the Havenford defense heavy opposition.

Anderson succeeded in making four goals, one of which was made on a pass from Shepherd at the end of the first half. Musser and Shepherd tallied the two remaining points for the regulars. No penalty points were scored during the game although Coach Jeffrey, playing center forward on the opposing team, came within inches of placing the ball between the goal posts.

Bob McKune, who returned to College two weeks ago, proved capable of holding the goal position during the coming season, although Tully showed himself an able second string man by his service on the pick-up team. Captain Bill Hutchinson and Bill Hensey, as fullbacks, and Daykin and Menselman in the halfback berths make up the varsity combination.

Unless the second team material improves in the scrimmages, Coach Jeffrey will enter the same lineup in the opening game Saturday. If Daykin, who received a strained ankle in the first quarter, is unable to start, the coach will place either Sol Saltzman or Carl Rolle in the center half position.

Evans' Dash for Score Duplicated By 4 Grid Stars

When Red Evans ran through the entire Marshall team for State's opening touchdown Saturday, there were six other eastern games in which the same feat occurred. Four of these unusual plays happened similarly on the opening kickoff, and two of them took place during the process of the games in which they occurred.

Austin Downs, little Georgian player, wriggled his way through the entire Yale team on the opening kickoff of the annual classic at New Haven, and Captain Eddie Baker of the Pitt Panthers accomplished a like feat in the Pitt-Western Reserve game at Cleveland.

Likewise Ralph Hewitt, all-American possibility of Lou Little's Columbia Lions, took the opening kickoff in the Columbia-Wesleyan game to tally the first Blue and White six-pointer, and Eby, Gettysburg star, caught Brenna's opening kickoff and stopped only when he had passed P. M. C.'s goal line. This score did not count, however, as the Bullets were penalized 25 yards for roughness.

In the remaining two games, Warren Stevens, Syracuse co-captain, raced the length of the field in the third quarter of the Syracuse-Rutgers game at Syracuse, and Bill Graupner, in the final period of the Penn-Virginia engagement, made his first appearance for the Quakers this season memorable by dashing the length of Franklin field when he returned a Cavalier punt.

Rekers Sets Pace For Varsity Distance Men—3 Yearlings Cross Line Together

With Captain Paul Rekers leading the pack down the homestretch, Coach Nate Cartmell's Nittany harriers engaged in their first time trial of the season over the 27-10-mile course Saturday afternoon.

The fleet Lion runner was clocked in 14 minutes 27 seconds, good time considering the earliness of the season and heat of the day. Chuck Messinger and Dick Detwiler crossed the finish line together nearly 150 yards behind their leader, to be timed in 11 minutes 56 seconds.

Napoleon, a member of last year's freshman team, was the next varsity aspirant to complete the course. He was followed in order by Robinson, King, Van Cise, Wolf, Glassburn, Siesky, Baud, Harvey and Turner. England, Rishel, and Vandermark, plebe harriers, finished the course in a dead heat to lead the freshman

Coach Cartmell will conduct a second time trial Friday afternoon for Varsity and freshman hill and dalers. The Nittany mentor has three dependable runners in Rekers, Messinger, and Detwiler, but the rest of the team which will race the Panthers at Pittsburgh October 25 remains in doubt.

Rekers has been displaying fine early season form and gives promise of repeating his stellar performances of last year. Messinger has not yet rounded into his best shape but is expected to be ready to show his heels to the Pitt runners in the opening meet. Detwiler has shown improvement over last season.

APPLE SALES FROM THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION ORCHARD

It has been difficult to establish prices on the apple crop this year, but the market atmosphere is clarifying a little with the harvest of winter apples. We are establishing the following retail prices:

All Number 1 grade of winter apples of 2½ in., 2¾ in., and 3 in. will retail in their original bushel package at \$2.00. The 2¼ in. size at \$1.50 per bushel.

The Number 2 grade of winter apples 2½ in., 2¾ in., and 3 in. will retail for \$1.25 a bushel in the original package. The Number 2 2¾ in. size will retail at the orchard packing house only. These will be in second hand baskets or paper bags at seventy-five cents per bushel.


Cider apples will retail at the fruit packing house only.

There will be some apples packed in one-half bushel tub baskets that will retail at \$1.15 per basket.

WE EXPECT TO BE ABLE TO SUPPLY APPLES TO THE TRADE IN STATE COLLEGE UNTIL JUNE FIRST, 1931. Varieties—McIntosh will last until about Nov. 25, followed by Stayman, Rome and Baldwin.
